Summary

Shares of Carter's have lagged the industry in the past three months. The company reported lower-than-expected fourth-quarter 2020 results, wherein both top and bottom lines declined year over year. This was mainly due to lower wholesale sales, soft store traffic and muted international demand. Also, COVID-19 costs related to additional protective equipment and cleaning supplies are likely to affect 2021 and first-quarter results. However, continued momentum in online demand backed by its revamped website with improved products, new mobile app and enhanced checkout experience is aiding online sales. Moreover, omni-channel efforts like the relaunch of the ship-in-store, same-day pickup and curbside pickup facilities bode well. Encouragingly, it expects sales growth and improved profitability in 2021.

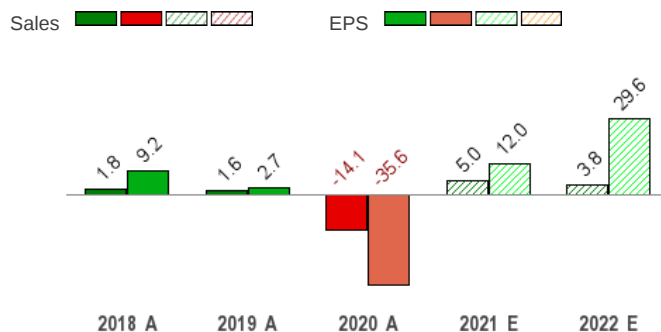

Overview

Headquartered in Atlanta, GA, Carter's Inc. is the largest marketer of branded apparel and related products for babies, and young children in North America.

Notably, the company has a portfolio of popular brands, including Carter's, OshKoshB'gosh, Just One You, Child of Mine, Simple Joys, Skip Hop, and Precious Firsts. It sells the products through leading department stores, national chains and specialty retailers, both domestically and internationally. Additionally, Carter's showcases its products through company-operated stores in the United States, Canada and Mexico, and its websites namely www.carters.com, www.oshkoshbgosh.com and www.cartersoshkosh.ca.

The company generated \$3 billion in net sales in 2020. As of Jan 2, 2021, it operated 1,100 stores in the United States, Canada and Mexico. Additionally, it had a solid wholesale presence in the United States (including department stores, national chain stores, specialty stores and discount retailers). It also operates through e-commerce sites in the United States, Canada and China as well as other international wholesale, licensing and online channels.

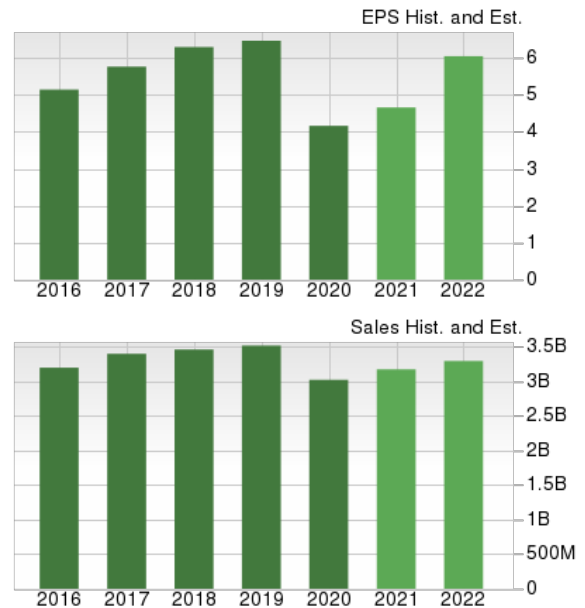
Of all the brands, Carter's and OshKoshB'gosh are the two most recognized and trusted names for young children's apparel. Among the rest, its Genuine Kids and Just One You brands are sold at Target, Child of Mine brand is sold at Walmart and Simple Joys brand is available on Amazon. The company's Skip Hop brand is a fast-growing global lifestyle brand and innovative leader in the children's durables product category.

The company's reportable segments include U.S. Retail, U.S. Wholesale and International.

The **U.S. Retail** segment includes the sale of its products through its U.S. retail and e-commerce websites.

The **U.S. Wholesale** segment consists of revenues, primarily from the sale of products to its U.S. wholesale partners.

The **International** segment comprises the sale of products outside the United States through its company and franchisee-operated retail stores in Canada and Mexico, e-commerce sites in Canada and China, and sales to its international wholesale customers.

Reasons To Sell:

- ▼ **Sluggish Q4 Sales:** Shares of Carter's declined 3.4% in the past three months against the industry's growth of 1.7%. The company's sales missed the Zacks Consensus Estimate in the fourth-quarter 2020 and also declined year over year. The year-over-year decline was driven by COVID-related disruptions, which led to lower wholesale sales, soft store traffic and muted demand from international customers, which were somewhat offset by strong e-commerce sales. Further, sales at the U.S. Retail, U.S. Wholesale and International segments witnessed declines of 5.5%, 16.9% and 13.4% year over year, respectively. The downside was mainly due to sluggish store traffic stemming from the ongoing COVID-19 situation.
- ▼ **High Costs Hurt Q4 Bottom Line:** During the fourth quarter, Carter's adjusted SG&A expenses rose 5% to \$327 million. This was mainly due to compensation-related costs, promotional activities, increased investment in marketing, digital media and omni-channel capabilities such as the launch of a new mobile app, website improvement as well as accelerating the speed and efficiency of its distribution centers. Consequently, adjusted earnings for the quarter under review came in at \$2.46 per share, reflecting a decline of 12% year over year. Persistence of this trend may hurt the bottom line further in the near term. In fact, management envisions adjusted earnings per share to be nearly 25 cents for the first quarter of 2021, suggesting a sharp decline from the year-ago quarter's 81 cents.
- ▼ **COVID-19 Related Costs, a Worry:** Carter's has been witnessing direct costs including health and safety-related expenses stemming from the COVID-19 crisis. In fact, management expects costs related to additional protective equipment and cleaning supplies to the tune of \$7 million and \$3 million for 2021 and first-quarter, respectively. That said, we believe that the persistence of such expenses or any rise in it may weigh on the company's profitability in the near term.
- ▼ **Currency Headwinds:** Carter's remains exposed to unfavorable foreign-currency impacts, which hurt the international segment to some extent, particularly Brazil and Argentina. Any fluctuation in foreign currency may act as a deterrent in the near term.

Carter's Q4 sales were largely impacted by lower wholesale sales, soft store traffic and muted demand from international customers. Also, COVID-19 related costs and currency woes remain concerns.

Risks

- **E-commerce Growth:** Carter's is seeking opportunities to strengthen e-commerce capabilities through investments to speed up deliveries. The company's e-commerce business has been performing well thus providing some cushion to its top line. Its revamped website with improved products, new mobile app and enhanced checkout experience is aiding online sales. In the fourth quarter, the company witnessed sturdy e-commerce demand in the wholesale channel to the tune of 36%. The company also gained more than 2 million new customers since the onset of the pandemic. Driven by these, online sales surpassed the \$1-billion mark in 2020. Strength in babywear acted as a key growth driver. Management had earlier anticipated e-commerce penetration to surge to 42% by 2024.
 - **Upbeat 2021 View Bodes Well:** Despite drab fourth-quarter 2020 results, Carter's expects sales growth and improved profitability in 2021. It also noted that 2021 started on a positive note, driven by spring product offerings and gains from government stimulus payments to families with young children. Apart from these, the company is well positioned to recover from the pandemic woes as vaccines are being distributed across the United States. Encouragingly, management expects net sales to grow almost 5% and a bottom-line increase of 10% for 2021. Also, the top and bottom-line growth are likely to be heavily weighted in the first half of 2021.
 - **Omni-Channel Capabilities:** Carter's has been making efforts to enhance omni-channel capabilities. In this regard, the company is gaining from its same-day pickup service for online orders, easy access to a broad array of online products when shopping in stores and easy access to its new credit card program. Even as stores have now reopened, consumers shift to the online platform due to the ongoing pandemic is likely to persist. As a result, the company is now focusing on its ship-from-store facility. Apart from these, management is offering same-day pickup and curbside pickup facilities in more than 600 stores in the United States. Going forward, the company anticipates omni-channel to increase roughly 40% of online sales by 2025.
 - **Debt Analysis:** Carter's long-term debt of \$989.5 million as of Jan 2, 2021, remained almost flat on a sequential basis. Moreover, its debt-to-capitalization ratio is at a respectable 0.51 compared with 0.55 reported in the prior quarter. Further, the company had earlier suspended share repurchase and quarterly dividends on a temporary basis in a bid to combat this ongoing hurdle. Also, it did not incur any capital spending in the reported quarter. The company has \$745 million remaining for borrowings under its revolving credit facility. That said, it boasts liquidity of \$1.8 billion at the end of the reported quarter, which is likely to help it stay afloat amid this crisis.

Last Earnings Report

Carter's Q4 Earnings & Sales Miss, 2021 View Upbeat

Carter's reported fourth-quarter 2020 results, wherein the bottom and top lines not only missed the Zacks Consensus Estimate but also declined year over year. Results were hurt by COVID-19 impacts, including soft store traffic and muted demand from international customers. However, robust e-commerce sales along with improved margins stemming from enhanced inventory management as well as better promotions and prices remained positives. Moreover, the company continued to witness healthy demand from a few of its largest customers, like Target, Amazon and Walmart.

Going ahead, management expects sales growth and improved profitability this year. It also noted that 2021 started on a positive note, driven by spring product offerings and gains from government stimulus payments to families with young children. Apart from these, the company is well positioned to recover from the pandemic woes as vaccines are being distributed across the United States.

Carter's reported fourth-quarter 2020 adjusted earnings of \$2.46 per share, missing the Zacks Consensus Estimate of \$2.92. Moreover, the figure declined 12% year over year from \$2.81 in the prior-year quarter.

Net sales decreased 10% to \$990 million and missed the Zacks Consensus Estimate of \$1,044 million. The year-over-year decline was due to COVID-related disruptions, which led to lower wholesale sales and soft store traffic, which were somewhat offset by strong e-commerce sales. However, an additional week in 2020 contributed to the top line to the tune of nearly \$32 million.

Its e-commerce business is performing well, backed by new capabilities such as curbside pickup and the direct shipment of e-commerce orders from stores. The company also gained more than 2 million new customers. Moreover, online sales surpassed the \$1-billion mark in 2020. Going forward, the company anticipates omnichannel to grow roughly 40% of online sales by 2025.

Segmental Sales

Sales at the **U.S. Retail** segment fell 5.5% year over year to \$585.8 million due to soft store sales. During the quarter, retail comparable sales declined 9% with solid e-commerce growth and weak store sales.

The **U.S. Wholesale** segment sales witnessed a decrease of 16.9% to \$290.1 million due to sluggishness in the Carter's brand and the off-price channel. On the flip side, strength in online demand and Little Baby Basics acted as key growth drivers.

The **International** segment witnessed a 13.4% decline in revenues to \$113.8 million in the fourth quarter due to market disruptions related to the ongoing COVID-19 situation, particularly in Canada and Mexico, as many stores remained shut in these markets.

Margins

Gross profit decreased 0.3% year over year to \$466 million, while gross margin expanded 460 basis points (bps) to 47.1%. The uptick can be attributable to improved pricing efforts, sturdy demand for its products, enhanced promotions and better inventory management.

The company's adjusted operating income was \$145 million, down 10.5% year over year from \$162 million reported in the prior-year quarter. Meanwhile, adjusted operating margin of 14.7% expanded 540 bps in the quarter under review. Apart from these, adjusted SG&A expenses rose 5% to \$327 million in the quarter.

Balance Sheet & Shareholder-Friendly Moves

The company ended 2020 with cash and cash equivalents of \$1,102.3 million, net long-term debt of \$989.5 million and shareholders' equity of \$938 million. In 2020, the company provided cash flow of \$589.9 million for operating activities. The company has \$745 million remaining for borrowings under its revolving credit facility. That said, it boasts liquidity of \$1.8 billion at the end of the reported quarter, which is likely to help it stay afloat amid this crisis.

Earlier, Carter's had suspended share repurchase and quarterly dividends on a temporary basis. Also, it did not incur any capital spending in the reported quarter.

In 2020, Carter's revealed plans to shut down 25% of stores whose leases have expired. Of these, 60% of store closures are likely to take place by the end of 2021 and 80% of such stores are expected to close by the end of 2022.

Outlook

Despite drab quarterly results, management expects net sales to grow almost 5% and a bottom-line increase of 10% for 2021. This guidance includes continued impacts of the pandemic and excludes \$7 million costs related to additional protective equipment and cleaning supplies. Also, the top and bottom-line growth are likely to be heavily weighted in the first half of 2021. However, Carter's envisions adjusted earnings per share to be nearly 25 cents for the first quarter, suggesting a sharp decline from the year-ago quarter's 81 cents. This too excludes roughly \$3 million of COVID-related costs.

Valuation

Carter's shares are down 4.5% in the year-to-date period but up nearly 24.2% over the trailing 12-month period. Stocks in the Zacks sub-industry and the Zacks Consumer Discretionary sector are up 3.4% and 10%, respectively, in the year-to-date period. Over the past year, the Zacks sub-industry and the sector are up 106.8% and 90.4%, respectively.

The S&P 500 index is up 5.9% over the year-to-date period and 66.4% in the past year.

The stock is currently trading at 18.09X forward 12-month earnings, which compares to 35.88X for the Zacks sub-industry, 35.47X for the Zacks sector and 22.52X for the S&P 500 index.

Over the past five years, the stock has traded as high as 20.9X and as low as 9.31X, with a 5-year median of 15.28X. Our Underperform recommendation indicates that the stock will perform worse than the market. Our \$76 price target reflects 15.3X forward 12-month earnings.

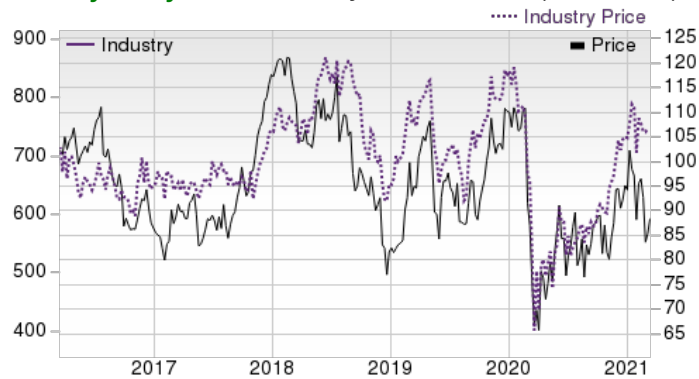

Glossary of Terms and Definitions

52-Week High-Low: The range of the highest and lowest prices at which a stock has traded during the past year. This range is determined based on the stock's daily closing price which may differ from the intra-day high or low. Many investors use it as a technical indicator to determine a stock's current value and future price movement. The idea here is that if price breaks out from the 52-week range, in either direction, the momentum may continue in the same direction.

20-Day Average Volume (Shares): The average number of shares of a company traded in a day over the last 20 days. It is a direct indication of a security's overall liquidity. The higher the average daily trading volume, the easier it is to enter or exit the stock at a desired price with more buyers and sellers being available.

Daily Price Change: This is the percentage difference between a trading day's closing price and the prior trading day's closing price. This item is updated at 9 p.m. EST each day.

1-Week Price Change: This is the percentage change in a stock's closing price over the last 5 trading days. This change reflects the collective buying and selling sentiment over the 1-week period.

A strong weekly price increase for the stock, especially when accompanied by increased volume, is an indication of it gaining momentum.

4-Week Price Change: This is the percentage change in a stock's closing price over the last 20 trading days or past 4 weeks. This is a medium-term price change metric and an indication of the stock gaining momentum.

12-Week Price Change: This is the percentage change of a stock's closing price over the last 60 trading days or past 12 weeks. Similar to 4-week price change, this is a medium-term price change metric. It shows whether a stock has been enjoying strong investor demand, or if it has been in consolidation, or distress over this period.

52-Week Price Change: This is the percentage change in a stock's closing price over the last 260 trading days or past 52 weeks. This long-term price change metric is a good reference point for investors. Some investors seek stocks with the best percentage price change over the last 52 weeks, expecting the momentum to continue.

Market Cap: The number of outstanding common shares of a company times its latest price per share. This figure represents a company's size, which indicates various characteristics, including price stability and risk, in which investors could be interested.

Year-To-Date Price Change: Change in a stock's daily closing price in the period of time beginning the first day of the current calendar year through to the previous trading day.

of Analysts: Number of EPS estimates used in calculating the current-quarter consensus. These estimates come from the brokerage analysts tracking this stock. However, the number of such analysts tracking this stock may not match the number of estimates, as all brokerage analysts may not come up with an estimate or provide it to us.

Beta: A measure of risk commonly used to compare the volatility of a stock to the overall market. The S&P 500 Index is the base for calculating beta and carries a value of 1. A stock with beta below 1 is less risky than the market as a whole. And a stock with beta above 1 is riskier.

Dividend: The portion of earnings a company is expected to distribute to its common shareholders in the next 12 months for each share they own. Dividends are usually paid quarterly. Dividend payments reflect positively on a company and help maintain investors' trust. Investors typically find dividend-paying stocks appealing because the dividend adds to any market price appreciation to result in higher return on investment (ROI). Moreover, a steady or increasing dividend payment provides investors a cushion in a down market.

Dividend Yield: The ratio of a company's annual dividend to its share price. The annual dividend used in the ratio is calculated based on the most recent dividend paid by the company. Dividend yield is an estimate of the dividend-only return from a stock in the next 12 months. Since dividend itself doesn't change frequently, dividend yield usually changes with a stock's price movement. As a result, often an unusually high dividend yield is a result of weak stock price.

S&P 500 Index: The Standard & Poor's 500 (S&P 500) Index is an unmanaged group of securities considered to be representative of the stock market in general. It is a market-capitalization-weighted index of stocks of the 500 largest U.S. companies. Each stock's weight in the index is proportionate to its market value.

Industry: One of the 250+ groups that Zacks classifies all stocks into based on the nature of business. These groups are termed as expanded (aka "X") industries and map to their respective (economic) sectors; Zacks has 16 sectors.

Zacks Industry Rank: The Zacks Industry Rank is determined by calculating the average Zacks Rank for all stocks in the industry and then assigning an ordinal rank to it. For example, an industry with an average Zacks Rank of 1.6 is better than an industry with an average Zacks Rank of 2.3. So, the industry with the better average Zacks Rank would get a better Zacks Industry Rank. If an industry has the best average Zacks Rank, it would be considered the top industry (1 out of 250+), which would place it at the top 1% of Zacks-ranked industries. Studies have shown that roughly half of a stock's price movement can be attributed to the industry group it belongs to. In fact, the top 50% of Zacks-ranked industries outperforms the bottom 50% by a factor of more than 2 to 1.

Last EPS Surprise: The percentage deviation of a company's last reported earnings per share from the Zacks Consensus Estimate. Companies with a positive earnings surprise are more likely to surprise again in the future (or miss again if they recently missed).

Last Sales Surprise: The percentage deviation of a company's last reported sales from the Zacks Consensus Estimate.

Expected Report Date: This is an estimated date of a company's next earnings release. The information originated or gathered by Zacks Investment Research from its information providers or publicly available sources is the basis of this estimate.

Earnings ESP: The Zacks Earnings ESP compares the Most Accurate Estimate to the Zacks Consensus Estimate for the yet-to-be reported quarter. The Most Accurate Estimate is the most recent version of the Zacks Consensus EPS Estimate. The idea here is that analysts revising their estimates closer to an earnings release have the latest information, which could potentially be more accurate than what they and others contributing to the consensus had predicted earlier. Thus, a positive or negative Earnings ESP reading theoretically indicates the likely deviation of the actual earnings from the consensus estimate. However, the model's predictive power is significant for positive ESP readings only. A positive Earnings ESP is a strong predictor of an earnings beat, particularly when combined with a Zacks Rank #1 (Strong Buy), #2 (Buy) or #3 (Hold). Our research shows that stocks with this combination produce a positive surprise nearly 70% of the time.

Periods:

TTM: Trailing 12 months. Using TTM figures is an effective way of analyzing the most-recent financial data in an annualized format that helps neutralize the effects of seasonality and other quarter-to-quarter variation.

F1: Current fiscal year. This period is used to analyze the estimates for the ongoing full fiscal year.

F2: Next fiscal year. This period is used to analyze the estimates for the next full fiscal year.

F12M: Forward 12 months. Using F12M figures is an effective way of analyzing the near-term (the following four unreported quarters) estimates in an annualized manner. Instead of typically representing estimates for the full fiscal year, which may not represent the nitty-gritty of each quarter, F12M figures suggest an all-inclusive annualized estimate for the following four quarters. The annualization helps neutralize the potential effects of seasonality and other quarter-to-quarter variations.

P/E Ratio: The price-to-earnings ratio measures a company's current market price per share relative to its earnings per share (EPS). Usually, the trailing-12-month (TTM) EPS, current-fiscal-year (F1) EPS estimate, or forward-12-month (F12M) EPS estimate is used as the denominator. In essence, this ratio shows what the market is willing to pay today for each dollar of EPS. In other words, this ratio gives a sense of what the relative value of the company is at the already reported level of earnings or at a future level of earnings.

It is one of the most widely-used multiples for determining the value of a company and helps comparing its valuation with that of a competitor, the industry group or a benchmark.

PEG Ratio: The price/earnings to growth ratio is a stock's P/E ratio using current fiscal year (F1) EPS estimate divided by its expected EPS growth rate over the coming 3 to 5 years. This ratio essentially determines a stock's value by factoring in the company's expected earnings growth and is thus believed to provide a more complete picture than just the P/E ratio, particularly for faster-growing companies.

P/S Ratio: The price-to-sales ratio is calculated as a company's current price per share divided by trailing 12 months (TTM) sales or revenues per share. This ratio shows what the market is willing to pay today for each dollar of TTM sales per share. The P/S ratio is at times the only valuation metric when the company has yet to become profitable.

Cash/Price Ratio: The cash-to-price ratio or Cash Yield is calculated as cash and marketable securities per share divided by the company's current share price. Like the earnings yield, which shows the anticipated yield (or return) on a stock from earnings for each dollar invested, the cash yield does the same, with cash being the source of return instead of earnings. For example, a cash/price ratio of 0.08 suggests a return of 8% or 8 cents for every \$1 investment.

EV/EBITDA Ratio: The EV/EBITDA ratio, also known as Enterprise Multiple, is calculated as a company's enterprise value (market capitalization + value of total long-term debt + book value of preferred shares - cash and marketable securities) divided by EBITDA (earnings before interest, taxes, depreciation and amortization). Usually, trailing-12-month (TTM) or forward-12-month (F12M) EBITDA is used as the denominator.

EV/Sales Ratio: The enterprise value-to-sales ratio is calculated as a company's enterprise value (market capitalization + value of total long-term debt + book value of preferred shares - cash and marketable securities) divided by annual sales. It is an expansion of the P/S valuation, which uses market value instead of enterprise value. The EV/Sales ratio is perceived as more accurate than P/S, in part, because the market capitalization does not take a company's debt into account when valuing it.

EV/CF Ratio: The enterprise value-to-cash flow ratio is calculated as a company's enterprise value (market capitalization + value of total long-term debt + book value of preferred shares - cash and marketable securities) divided by the trailing-12-month (TTM) operating cash flow. It's a measure of how long it would take to buy the entire business if you were able to use all the company's operating cash flow.

The EV/CF ratio is perceived as more accurate than the P/CF ratio, in part, because the market price does not take a company's debt into account when valuing it.

EV/FCF Ratio: The enterprise value-to-free cash flow metric compares a company's enterprise value to its trailing-12-month (TTM) free cash flow (FCF). This metric is very similar to the EV/CF ratio, but is considered a more exact measure owing to the fact that it uses free cash flow, which subtracts capital expenditures (CAPEX) from a company's total operating cash flow, thereby reflecting the actual cash flow available for funding growth activities and payments to shareholders.

P/EBITDA Ratio: The P/EBITDA ratio is calculated as a company's per share market value divided by EBITDA (earnings before interest, taxes, depreciation, and amortization). This metric is very similar to the EV/EBITDA ratio, but is considered a little less exact measure as it uses market price, which does not take a company's debt into account. However, since EBITDA is often considered a proxy for cash income, the metric is used as a measure of what the market is willing to pay today for each dollar of the company's cash profitability in the trailing 12 months (TTM) or forward 12 months (F12M).

P/B Ratio: The price-to-book ratio is calculated as a company's current price per share divided by its book value (total assets – liabilities – preferred stocks) per share. In short, the book value is how much a company is worth. In other words, it reflects the total value of a company's assets that its common shareholders would receive if it were to be liquidated. So, the P/B ratio indicates whether you're paying higher or lower than what would remain if the company went bankrupt immediately. Investors typically use this metric to determine how a company's stock price stacks up to its intrinsic value.

P/TB Ratio: The price-to-tangible-book value ratio is calculated as a the per share market value of a company divided by the value of its tangible assets (total assets – liabilities – preferred stocks – intangible assets) per share. Tangible book value is the same thing as book value except it excludes the value of intangible assets to get a step closer to the baseline value of the company.

P/CF Ratio: The price-to-cash flow ratio measures a company's per share market price relative to its trailing-12-month (TTM) operating cash flow per share. This metric is used to determine whether a company is undervalued or overvalued relative to another stock, industry or sector. And like the P/E ratio, a lower number is typically considered better from the value perspective.

One of the reasons why P/CF ratio is often preferred over P/E ratio is the fact that operating cash flow adds back non-cash expenses such as depreciation and amortization to net income. This feature helps valuing stocks that have positive cash flow but are not profitable because of large noncash charges.

P/FCF Ratio: The price-to-free cash flow ratio is an extension of P/CF ratio, which uses trailing-12-month (TTM) free cash flow per share instead of operating cash flow per share. This metric is considered a more exact measure than P/CF ratio, as free cash flow subtracts capital expenditures (CAPEX) from a company's total operating cash flow, thereby reflecting the actual cash flow available for funding activities that generate additional revenues.

Earnings Yield: The earnings yield is calculated as current fiscal year (F1) EPS estimate divided by the company's current share price. The ratio, which is the inverse of the P/E ratio, measures the anticipated yield (or return) from earnings for each dollar invested in a stock today.

For example, earnings yield for a stock, which is trading at \$35 and expected to earn \$3 per share in the current fiscal year (F1), would be 0.0857 ($3/35 = 0.0857$) or 8.57%. In other words, for \$1 invested in the stock today, the yield from earnings is anticipated to be 8.57 cents.

Investors most commonly compare the earnings yield of a stock to that of a broad market index (such as the S&P 500) and prevailing interest rates, such as the current 10-year Treasury yield. Since bonds and stocks compete for investors' dollars, stock investors typically demand a higher yield for the extra risk they assume compared to investors of U.S. Treasury-backed securities that offer virtually risk-free returns. This additional return is referred to as the risk premium.

Debt/Equity Ratio: The debt-to-equity ratio is calculated as a company's total liabilities divided by its shareholder equity. This metric is used to gauge a company's financial leverage. In other words, it is a measure of the degree to which a company is financing its operations through debt versus its own funds. The higher the ratio, the higher the risk for shareholders.

However, this ratio is difficult to compare across industry groups where ideal amounts of debt vary. Some businesses are more capital intensive than others and typically require higher debt to finance their operations. So, a company's debt-to-equity ratio should be compared with other companies in the same industry.

Cash Flow (\$/share): Cash flow per share is calculated as operating cash flow (after-tax earnings + depreciation + other non-cash charges) divided by common shares outstanding. It is used by many investors as a measure of a company's financial strength. Since cash flow per share takes into consideration a company's ability to generate cash by adding back non-cash expenses, it is regarded by some as a more accurate measure of a company's financial situation than earnings per share, which could be artificially deflated.

Current Ratio: The current ratio or liquidity ratio is a company's current assets divided by its current liabilities. It measures a company's ability to pay short-term obligations. A current ratio that is in line with the industry average or slightly higher is generally considered acceptable. A current ratio that is lower than the industry average would indicate a higher risk of distress or default. A higher number is usually better. However, a very high current ratio compared to the industry average could be an indication of inefficient use of assets by management.

Debt/Capital Ratio: Debt-to-capital ratio is a company's total debt (interest-bearing debt + both short- and long-term liabilities) divided its total capital (interest-bearing debt + shareholders' equity). It is a measure of a company's financial leverage. All else being equal, the higher the debt-to-capital ratio, the riskier the stock.

However, this ratio can vary widely from industry to industry, the ideal amount of required debt being different. Some businesses are more capital intensive than others and typically require higher debt to finance their operations. So, a company's debt-to-capital ratio should be compared with the same for its industry.

Net Margin: Net margin is calculated as net income divided by sales. It shows how much of each dollar in sales generated by a company translates into profit. For example, if a company's net margin is 15%, its net income is 15 cents for every \$1 of sales it makes.

A change in margin can reflect either a change in business conditions, or a company's cost controls, or both. If a company's expenses are growing faster than sales, its net margin will decline. However, different net margin rates are considered good for different industries, so it's better to compare net margin rates of companies in the same industry group.

Return on Equity: Return on equity (ROE) is calculated as trailing-12-month net income divided by trailing-12-month average shareholder equity (including reinvested earnings). This metric is considered a measure of how effectively management is using a company's assets to generate profits. For example, if a company's ROE is 10%, it creates 10 cents profits for every \$1 shareholder equity, which is basically the company's assets minus debt. A company's ROE deemed good or bad depends on what's normal for its peers or industry group.

Sales/Assets Ratio: The sales-to-assets ratio or asset utilization ratio or asset turnover ratio is calculated as a company's annual sales divided by average assets (average of assets at the beginning of the year and at the year's end). This metric helps investors understand how effectively a company is using its assets to generate sales. For example, a sales-to-assets ratio of 2.5 indicates that the company generated \$2.50 in sales for every \$1 of assets on its books.

The higher the sales-to-assets ratio, the better the company is performing. However, similar to many other ratios, the asset turnover ratio tends to be higher for companies in certain industries/sectors than in others. So, a company's sales-to-assets ratio should be compared with the same for its industry/sector.

Historical EPS Growth (3-5 Years): This is the average annual (trailing-12-month) EPS growth rate over the last 3-5 years. This metric helps investors see how a company's EPS has grown from a long-term perspective.

Note: There are many factors that can influence short-term numbers — a recession will reduce this number, while a recovery will inflate it. The longterm perspective helps smooth out short-term events.

Projected EPS Growth (F1/F0): This is the estimated EPS growth rate for the current financial year. It is calculated as the consensus estimate for the current fiscal year (F1) divided by the reported EPS for the last completed fiscal year (F0).

Current Cash Flow Growth: It measures the latest year-over-year change in operating cash flow. Cash flow growth tells an investor how quickly a company is generating inflows of cash from operations. A positive change in the cash flow is desired and shows that more 'cash' is coming in than going out.

Historical Cash Flow Growth (3-5 Years): This is the annualized change in cash flow over the last 3-5 years. The change in a longer period helps put the current reading into proper perspective. By looking at the rate, rather than the actual dollar value, the comparison across the industry and peers becomes easier.

Projected Sales Growth (F1/F0): This metric looks at the estimated sales growth for the current year. It is calculated as sales estimate for the current fiscal year (F1) divided by the reported sales for the last completed fiscal year (F0).

Like EPS growth, a higher rate is better for sales growth. A look at a company's projected sales growth instantly tells you what the outlook is for their products and services. However, different sales growth rates are considered good for different industries, so it's better to compare sales growth rates of companies in the same industry group.

EPS F1 Estimate 1-Week Change: The percentage change in the Zacks Consensus EPS estimate for the current fiscal year over the past week. The change in a company's consensus EPS estimate (or earnings estimate revision) has proven to be strongly correlated with the near-term price movement of its shares. It is an integral part of the Zacks Rank.

If a stock's consensus EPS estimate is \$1.10 now versus \$1.00 a week ago, that will be reflected as a 10% upward revision. If, on the other hand, it went from \$1.00 to 90 cents, that would be a 10% downward revision.

EPS F1 Estimate 4-Week Change: The percentage change in the Zacks Consensus EPS estimate for the current fiscal year over the past four weeks.

A stock's earnings estimate revision in a 1-week period is important. But it's more meaningful to look at the longer-term revision. And, of course, the 4-week change helps put the 1-week change into proper perspective.

EPS F1 Estimate 12-Week Change: The percentage change in the Zacks Consensus EPS estimate for the current fiscal year over the past 12 weeks.

This metric essentially shows how the consensus EPS estimate has changed over a period longer than 1 week or 4 weeks.

EPS Q1 Estimate Monthly Change: The percentage change in the Zacks Consensus EPS estimate for the current fiscal quarter over the past four weeks.

While the revision in consensus EPS estimate for the current fiscal year is strongly correlated with the near-term price movement of its shares, the estimate revision for the current fiscal quarter is an important metric as well, especially over the short term, and particularly as a stock approaches its earnings date. If a stock's Q1 EPS estimate decreases ahead of its earnings release, it's usually a negative sign, whereas an increase is a positive sign.
