Summary

EA's digital and live services revenues are expected to gain from portfolio strength on the back of franchises including *Apex Legends*, *FIFA*, *Madden NFL* and *Star Wars*. EA SPORTS titles and *Battlefield* are some of its biggest franchises driving active player base. Moreover, EA has a strong slate of game releases for the rest of fiscal 2021 that are likely to boost its top-line growth. The availability of *Madden NFL 21* and *FIFA 21* on Xbox and PS 5 worldwide is a key catalyst. EA continues to benefit from spike in demand for video games due to coronavirus-induced social distancing norms. However, intensifying competition from Activision and Take-Two Interactive is a significant headwind. Notably, shares have underperformed the industry year to date.

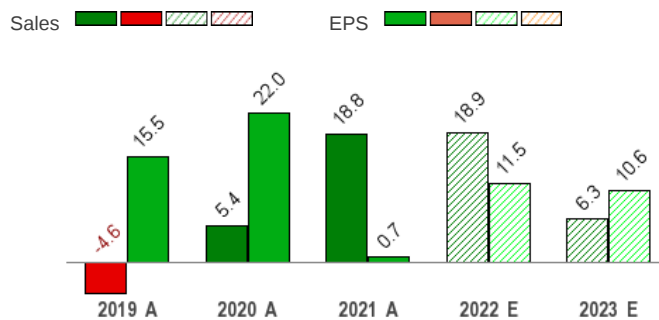

Overview

Headquartered in Redwood City, CA, Electronic Arts is a leading developer, marketer, publisher and distributor of interactive games (video game software and content).

Electronic Arts, popularly known as EA, distributes its gaming content and services through multiple distribution channels as well as directly to consumers (online and wirelessly) through its online portals — Origin and Play4Free.

EA games can be played on video consoles, personal computers, mobile devices, tablets and electronic readers. The company generates revenues from the sale of disk-based video game products (known as packaged goods), downloadable contents (DLCs), subscription, micro-transactions and advertising.

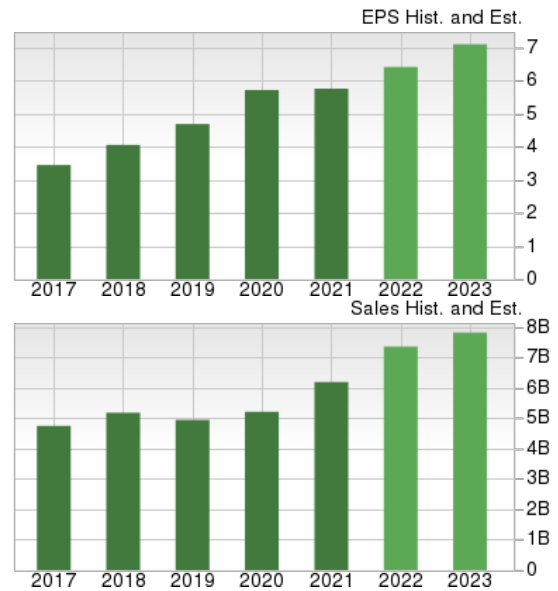
EA generated revenues of \$5.62 billion in fiscal 2021, of which live services and other revenues contributed 74% and the remaining were generated from packaged goods and full game downloads.

Net bookings for fiscal 2021 was \$6.19 billion, up 15% year over year, and over \$600 million above original expectations.

EA delivered 13 new games in fiscal year 2021, and welcomed more than 42 million new players to its network of more than 500 million unique accounts.

The company operates in three divisions — EA Studios, Maxis and EA Mobile. EA Studios includes DICE (Sweden), EA Canada (Canada), Tiburon (the United States), BioWare (Canada and the United States) and Visceral (the United States).

EA faces substantial competition from console and personal computer game publishers and diversified media companies that include Sony, Microsoft, Nintendo, Activision Blizzard, Take-Two Interactive and Ubisoft. In the mobile and social gaming market, the company competes with Zynga.



Reasons To Buy:

- ▲ EA has been the primary beneficiary of the ongoing shift from physical to digital versions of video games. Notably, contribution of the digital business to EA's revenues increased from 57% in fiscal 2017 to 67% in fiscal 2018 and 75% in fiscal 2019. The company expects the digital business to continue to grow primarily on the back of live services and a strong mobile business. Moreover, compared with the physical platform, digital games are more profitable due to minimum packaging cost. In addition, the company's freemium and extra content services are generating significant market traction, which is driving the top line.
- ▲ EA's popularity is primarily driven by its well-known franchises, which will continue to fuel the top line. EA SPORTS titles along with *Battlefield*, *Titanfall* and *Star Wars* are some of its biggest franchises. Additionally, the video game company is gaining traction with *The Sims* franchise, which is a positive. Moreover, coronavirus has been a tailwind for the company. As more and more people were compelled to stay at home due to lockdowns and physical distance measures, EA witnessed rising usage and engagement levels for many of its games including *The Sims 4*, *Apex Legends* and *FIFA* in the fiscal fourth quarter while new games like *Medal of Honor: Above and Beyond*, *Need for Speed Hot Pursuit Remastered* and *UFC 4* gained momentum.
- ▲ EA's latest battle royale (BR) game — *Apex Legends* — is an instant hit. The game has smashed the records of Epic Game's *Fortnite* in this genre. The company is in talks with Tencent to bring the game to China. Notably, EA lacks significant presence in China apart from *FIFA* and a few mobile games. Thus, *Apex Legends* will boost EA's footprint in China's PC-gaming market, which is a positive.
- ▲ EA's strong liquidity and cash flow-generating ability make the stock attractive to investors. As of Mar 31, 2021, the company had \$6.36 billion in cash and short-term investments compared with \$6.71 billion as of Dec 31, 2020. In comparison, EA had total debt of \$1.87 billion as of Mar 31, 2021 which is easily manageable for the company.

EA has been the primary beneficiary of the ongoing shift from physical to digital versions of video games. Core franchises like *FIFA* and *The Sims* are driving growth.

Reasons To Sell:

- ▼ Video games are hit driven. Though EA has a powerful line up of games that can be repeatedly upgraded, there is no assurance that a particular game will be a hit. Moreover, the video game business is highly cyclical and heavily dependent on time-to-time upgrade/introduction of new game software and hardware systems.
- ▼ The video game publishing industry is intensely competitive. EA faces significant competition from the likes of Take Two Interactive and Activision Blizzard. The resultant pressure can exert pressure on margins and lead to market share losses. Lower volume of packaged goods sales are a drag on margins. EA's continued investment in the digital market may also hurt profitability in the near term.
- ▼ EA is now expected to release the next installment of *Battlefield* to fiscal 2022, which is disappointing for players. Deferred game releases and lack of a new *Battlefield* game are also expected to hurt EA's competitive position against Activision's Call of Duty franchise.
- ▼ EA is dependent on few well-known franchises like *FIFA*, *Battlefield* and *Star Wars* for revenue generation. This doesn't bode well for the company. EA's failure to expand its game franchise is a major concern amid rising competition.

The video game industry is inherently hit driven and highly competitive. EA faces significant competition from the likes of Take Two Interactive and Activision Blizzard.

Last Earnings Report

Electronic Arts Q4 Earnings and Revenues Decline Y/Y

Electronic Arts reported fourth-quarter fiscal 2021 earnings of 26 cents per share, which plunged 81.8% year over year.

Revenues decreased 3% year over year to \$1.34 billion.

The Zacks Consensus Estimate for earnings and revenues was pegged at \$1.04 per share and \$1.39 billion, respectively.

Net bookings increased 18.6% year over year to \$1.40 billion, better than management's guidance of \$1.37 billion, driven by robust live services performance.

Apex Legends delivered its largest net bookings quarter on record. Moreover, *Apex Legends* launched Season 8 and averaged over 12 million weekly average users, which aided net bookings growth.

During the fiscal fourth quarter, EA completed the acquisition of Codemasters Group Holdings plc. Codemasters was integrated into EA for financial reporting purposes and EA's financial results for the fiscal fourth quarter and fiscal 2021 include Codemasters' financial results from and after Feb 18, 2021, the closing date of the Codemasters acquisition.

Quarter Details

EA's full-game revenues (18.6% of total revenues) decreased 29.8% year over year to \$250 million. Net bookings from full games decreased 30% year over year to \$187 million.

Further segregating full-game revenues, full-game download revenues decreased 12% year over year to \$187 million. Revenues from packaged goods plunged 55% year over year to \$65 million.

Live services and other revenues (81.4% of total revenues) rose 6.3% year over year to \$1.09 billion. Net bookings from live services increased 32% year over year to \$1.3 billion.

Live services performance was primarily driven by *FIFA Ultimate Team* and *Apex Legends*.

Based on platforms, revenues from console decreased 5% year over year to \$879 million in the reported quarter. Net bookings from console increased 21% year over year to \$950 million.

Revenues from PC/browser increased 8% year over year to \$295 million. Net bookings from PC/browser increased 23% year over year to \$346 million.

Revenues from mobile platform declined 7% year over year to \$172 million. Net bookings from mobile increased 2% year over year to \$194 million.

Important Game & Player Metrics

In the fiscal fourth quarter, average daily active *FIFA* players were up 10% year over year, demonstrating continued engagement late into the season. During the fiscal year, *FIFA Ultimate Team* players grew 16% and FUT matches were up 180%.

Mobile showed its fourth consecutive quarter of year-on-year growth, with outperformance led by *Star Wars: Galaxy of Heroes* and *The Sims*.

Apex Legends has more than 100 million players life to date on console/PC. Meanwhile, *The Sims 4* delivered its sixth consecutive year of growth and has almost 36 million players life to date.

Markedly, the company added 42 million new players to the EA network during the fiscal year 2021.

Operating Details

EA's GAAP gross profit decreased 8.1% from the year-ago quarter to \$1.02 billion. Gross margin contracted 430 basis points (bps) on a year-over-year basis to 76.3%.

Operating expenses increased 18.8% from the year-ago quarter to \$521 million. As a percentage of revenues, operating expenses expanded from 51.7% in the year-ago quarter to 63.3% in the reported quarter.

As a percentage of revenues, marketing & sales (M&S), research & development (R&D) and general & administrative (G&A) expenses expanded 250 bps, 580 bps and 270 bps respectively.

Operating income on a GAAP basis decreased 56.4% year over year to \$175 million. Operating margin contracted from 28.9% in the year-ago quarter to 13% in the reported quarter.

Balance Sheet and Cash Flow

As of Mar 31, 2021, EA had \$6.36 billion in cash and short-term investments compared with \$6.71 billion as of Dec 31, 2020.

Net cash from operating activities in the reported quarter was \$371 million compared with \$1.12 billion in the previous quarter and \$498 million in the year-ago quarter.

EA repurchased 2.4 million shares for \$325 million during the quarter, bringing the total for the fiscal year to 5.6 million shares for \$729 million.

The company also declared a quarterly cash dividend of 17 cents per share. The dividend will be paid out on Jun 23, 2021 to shareholders of record as of the close of business on Jun 2, 2021.

Guidance

For the first quarter of fiscal 2022, EA expects GAAP revenues of \$1.475 billion, cost of revenues to be \$287 million, and operating expenses of \$955 million. EA anticipates earnings per share of 24 cents for the fiscal first quarter. Net bookings are expected to be \$1.25 billion.

For fiscal 2022, EA expects revenues of \$6.8 billion, cost of revenues to be \$1.828 billion, and earnings per share of \$1.34.

The company raised net bookings expectations for the year to be \$7.3 billion, up around 18% year over year, which includes the impact of acquisitions of Glu Mobile, Codemasters and Metalhead Software.

This is driven by continued strength in its live services, particularly *Ultimate Team* and *Apex Legends*.

The *Apex Legends* franchise is expected to deliver well over \$750 million in net bookings this fiscal year, up around 20% year over year.

Operating cash flow is estimated to be \$1.75 billion.

Recent News

On Jun 9, EA unveiled *Battlefield 2042*, a first-person shooter game featuring matches with up to 128 players. The game is set to be launched on Oct 22, 2021.

On May 21, EA announced the release of *Knockout City*, a thrilling team-based multiplayer game. Knockout City challenges dodge-brawlers to a fast-paced gameplay with cross-play and cross-progression.

On May 17, EA announced a partnership with PGA of America to bring *PGA Championship* to EA SPORTS PGA Tour in Spring 2022. The game will also include tutorials and coaching challenges, designed in collaboration with the PGA Education and Player Development Departments.

On May 14, EA announced the release of the latest edition of science fiction role-playing game trilogy, *Mass Effect Legendary Edition* on PC via Origin, EA Desktop app and Steam, PlayStation 4 and Xbox One.

On May 5, EA announced the acquisition of Metalhead Software, a talented Canada-based video game studio and developer of the Super Mega Baseball franchise. EA SPORTS and Metalhead are teaming up to grow the *Super Mega Baseball* franchise as well as develop new gaming and sports experiences for players worldwide.

On Apr 29, EA announced the completion of its acquisition of Glu Mobile for \$2.1 billion in enterprise value. The deal will add significant growth to EA's mobile business, building on its network of 100 million monthly active players in mobile, and creating a market-leading portfolio of more than 15 top live services across multiple fast-growing genres.

On Apr 15, EA and Codemasters unveiled *F1 2021*, a new next-generation racing experience launching on Jul 16, featuring the teams, drivers and circuits for the 2021 FIA Formula One World Championship.

Valuation

Electronic Arts shares are up 2% in the year-to-date period and 15.7% over the trailing 12-month period. Stocks in the Zacks sub-industry are up 2.1% while the same in the Zacks Consumer Discretionary sector are up 0.6% in the year-to-date period. Over the past year, the Zacks sub-industry and sector is up 29.4% and 32%, respectively.

The S&P 500 index is up 13.9% in the year-to-date period and 40.6% in the past year.

The stock is currently trading at 22.32X forward 12-month earnings, which compares to 27.01X for the Zacks sub-industry, 29.81X for the Zacks sector and 21.86X for the S&P 500 index.

Over the past five years, the stock has traded as high as 35.45X and as low as 18.01X, with a 5-year median of 27.37X. Our Neutral recommendation indicates that the stock will perform in-line with the market. Our \$154 price target reflects 23.44X forward 12-month earnings.

Zacks Stock Rating System

We offer two rating systems that take into account investors' holding horizons: Zacks Rank and Zacks Recommendation. Each provides valuable insights into the future profitability of the stock and can be used separately or in combination with each other depending on your investment style.

Zacks Recommendation

The Zacks Recommendation aims to predict performance over the next 6 to 12 months. The foundation for the quantitatively determined Zacks Recommendation is trends in the company's estimate revisions and earnings outlook. The Zacks Recommendation is broken down into 3 Levels; Outperform, Neutral and Underperform. Unlike many Wall Street firms, we maintain a balance between the number of Outperform and Neutral recommendations. Our team of 70 analysts are fully versed in the benefits of earnings estimate revisions and how that is harnessed through the Zacks quantitative rating system. But we have given our analysts the ability to override the Zacks Recommendation for the 1200 stocks that they follow. The reason for the analyst over-rides is that there are often factors such as valuation, industry conditions and management effectiveness that a trained investment professional can spot better than a quantitative model.

Zacks Rank

The Zacks Rank is our short-term rating system that is most effective over the one- to three-month holding horizon. The underlying driver for the quantitatively-determined Zacks Rank is the same as the Zacks Recommendation, and reflects trends in earnings estimate revisions.

Zacks Style Scores

The Zacks Style Score is as a complementary indicator to the Zacks rating system, giving investors a way to focus on the highest rated stocks that best fit their own stock picking preferences.

Academic research has proven that stocks with the best Value, Growth and Momentum characteristics outperform the market. The Zacks Style Scores rate stocks on each of these individual styles and assigns a rating of A, B, C, D and F. We also produce the VGM Score (V for Value, G for Growth and M for Momentum), which combines the weighted average of the individual Style Scores into one score. This is perfectly suited for those who want their stocks to have the best scores across the board.

Glossary of Terms and Definitions

52-Week High-Low: The range of the highest and lowest prices at which a stock has traded during the past year. This range is determined based on the stock's daily closing price which may differ from the intra-day high or low. Many investors use it as a technical indicator to determine a stock's current value and future price movement. The idea here is that if price breaks out from the 52-week range, in either direction, the momentum may continue in the same direction.

20-Day Average Volume (Shares): The average number of shares of a company traded in a day over the last 20 days. It is a direct indication of a security's overall liquidity. The higher the average daily trading volume, the easier it is to enter or exit the stock at a desired price with more buyers and sellers being available.

Daily Price Change: This is the percentage difference between a trading day's closing price and the prior trading day's closing price. This item is updated at 9 p.m. EST each day.

1-Week Price Change: This is the percentage change in a stock's closing price over the last 5 trading days. This change reflects the collective buying and selling sentiment over the 1-week period.

A strong weekly price increase for the stock, especially when accompanied by increased volume, is an indication of it gaining momentum.

4-Week Price Change: This is the percentage change in a stock's closing price over the last 20 trading days or past 4 weeks. This is a medium-term price change metric and an indication of the stock gaining momentum.

12-Week Price Change: This is the percentage change of a stock's closing price over the last 60 trading days or past 12 weeks. Similar to 4-week price change, this is a medium-term price change metric. It shows whether a stock has been enjoying strong investor demand, or if it has been in consolidation, or distress over this period.

52-Week Price Change: This is the percentage change in a stock's closing price over the last 260 trading days or past 52 weeks. This long-term price change metric is a good reference point for investors. Some investors seek stocks with the best percentage price change over the last 52 weeks, expecting the momentum to continue.

Market Cap: The number of outstanding common shares of a company times its latest price per share. This figure represents a company's size, which indicates various characteristics, including price stability and risk, in which investors could be interested.

Year-To-Date Price Change: Change in a stock's daily closing price in the period of time beginning the first day of the current calendar year through to the previous trading day.

of Analysts: Number of EPS estimates used in calculating the current-quarter consensus. These estimates come from the brokerage analysts tracking this stock. However, the number of such analysts tracking this stock may not match the number of estimates, as all brokerage analysts may not come up with an estimate or provide it to us.

Beta: A measure of risk commonly used to compare the volatility of a stock to the overall market. The S&P 500 Index is the base for calculating beta and carries a value of 1. A stock with beta below 1 is less risky than the market as a whole. And a stock with beta above 1 is riskier.

Dividend: The portion of earnings a company is expected to distribute to its common shareholders in the next 12 months for each share they own. Dividends are usually paid quarterly. Dividend payments reflect positively on a company and help maintain investors' trust. Investors typically find dividend-paying stocks appealing because the dividend adds to any market price appreciation to result in higher return on investment (ROI). Moreover, a steady or increasing dividend payment provides investors a cushion in a down market.

Dividend Yield: The ratio of a company's annual dividend to its share price. The annual dividend used in the ratio is calculated based on the most recent dividend paid by the company. Dividend yield is an estimate of the dividend-only return from a stock in the next 12 months. Since dividend itself doesn't change frequently, dividend yield usually changes with a stock's price movement. As a result, often an unusually high dividend yield is a result of weak stock price.

S&P 500 Index: The Standard & Poor's 500 (S&P 500) Index is an unmanaged group of securities considered to be representative of the stock market in general. It is a market-capitalization-weighted index of stocks of the 500 largest U.S. companies. Each stock's weight in the index is proportionate to its market value.

Industry: One of the 250+ groups that Zacks classifies all stocks into based on the nature of business. These groups are termed as expanded (aka "X") industries and map to their respective (economic) sectors; Zacks has 16 sectors.

Zacks Industry Rank: The Zacks Industry Rank is determined by calculating the average Zacks Rank for all stocks in the industry and then assigning an ordinal rank to it. For example, an industry with an average Zacks Rank of 1.6 is better than an industry with an average Zacks Rank of 2.3. So, the industry with the better average Zacks Rank would get a better Zacks Industry Rank. If an industry has the best average Zacks Rank, it would be considered the top industry (1 out of 250+), which would place it at the top 1% of Zacks-ranked industries. Studies have shown that roughly half of a stock's price movement can be attributed to the industry group it belongs to. In fact, the top 50% of Zacks-ranked industries outperforms the bottom 50% by a factor of more than 2 to 1.

Last EPS Surprise: The percentage deviation of a company's last reported earnings per share from the Zacks Consensus Estimate. Companies with a positive earnings surprise are more likely to surprise again in the future (or miss again if they recently missed).

Last Sales Surprise: The percentage deviation of a company's last reported sales from the Zacks Consensus Estimate.

Expected Report Date: This is an estimated date of a company's next earnings release. The information originated or gathered by Zacks Investment Research from its information providers or publicly available sources is the basis of this estimate.

Earnings ESP: The Zacks Earnings ESP compares the Most Accurate Estimate to the Zacks Consensus Estimate for the yet-to-be reported quarter. The Most Accurate Estimate is the most recent version of the Zacks Consensus EPS Estimate. The idea here is that analysts revising their estimates closer to an earnings release have the latest information, which could potentially be more accurate than what they and others contributing to the consensus had predicted earlier. Thus, a positive or negative Earnings ESP reading theoretically indicates the likely deviation of the actual earnings from the consensus estimate. However, the model's predictive power is significant for positive ESP readings only. A positive Earnings ESP is a strong predictor of an earnings beat, particularly when combined with a Zacks Rank #1 (Strong Buy), #2 (Buy) or #3 (Hold). Our research shows that stocks with this combination produce a positive surprise nearly 70% of the time.

Periods:

TTM: Trailing 12 months. Using TTM figures is an effective way of analyzing the most-recent financial data in an annualized format that helps neutralize the effects of seasonality and other quarter-to-quarter variation.

F1: Current fiscal year. This period is used to analyze the estimates for the ongoing full fiscal year.

F2: Next fiscal year. This period is used to analyze the estimates for the next full fiscal year.

F12M: Forward 12 months. Using F12M figures is an effective way of analyzing the near-term (the following four unreported quarters) estimates in an annualized manner. Instead of typically representing estimates for the full fiscal year, which may not represent the nitty-gritty of each quarter, F12M figures suggest an all-inclusive annualized estimate for the following four quarters. The annualization helps neutralize the potential effects of seasonality and other quarter-to-quarter variations.

P/E Ratio: The price-to-earnings ratio measures a company's current market price per share relative to its earnings per share (EPS). Usually, the trailing-12-month (TTM) EPS, current-fiscal-year (F1) EPS estimate, or forward-12-month (F12M) EPS estimate is used as the denominator. In essence, this ratio shows what the market is willing to pay today for each dollar of EPS. In other words, this ratio gives a sense of what the relative value of the company is at the already reported level of earnings or at a future level of earnings.

It is one of the most widely-used multiples for determining the value of a company and helps comparing its valuation with that of a competitor, the industry group or a benchmark.

PEG Ratio: The price/earnings to growth ratio is a stock's P/E ratio using current fiscal year (F1) EPS estimate divided by its expected EPS growth rate over the coming 3 to 5 years. This ratio essentially determines a stock's value by factoring in the company's expected earnings growth and is thus believed to provide a more complete picture than just the P/E ratio, particularly for faster-growing companies.

P/S Ratio: The price-to-sales ratio is calculated as a company's current price per share divided by trailing 12 months (TTM) sales or revenues per share. This ratio shows what the market is willing to pay today for each dollar of TTM sales per share. The P/S ratio is at times the only valuation metric when the company has yet to become profitable.

Cash/Price Ratio: The cash-to-price ratio or Cash Yield is calculated as cash and marketable securities per share divided by the company's current share price. Like the earnings yield, which shows the anticipated yield (or return) on a stock from earnings for each dollar invested, the cash yield does the same, with cash being the source of return instead of earnings. For example, a cash/price ratio of 0.08 suggests a return of 8% or 8 cents for every \$1 investment.

EV/EBITDA Ratio: The EV/EBITDA ratio, also known as Enterprise Multiple, is calculated as a company's enterprise value (market capitalization + value of total long-term debt + book value of preferred shares - cash and marketable securities) divided by EBITDA (earnings before interest, taxes, depreciation and amortization). Usually, trailing-12-month (TTM) or forward-12-month (F12M) EBITDA is used as the denominator.

EV/Sales Ratio: The enterprise value-to-sales ratio is calculated as a company's enterprise value (market capitalization + value of total long-term debt + book value of preferred shares - cash and marketable securities) divided by annual sales. It is an expansion of the P/S valuation, which uses market value instead of enterprise value. The EV/Sales ratio is perceived as more accurate than P/S, in part, because the market capitalization does not take a company's debt into account when valuing it.

EV/CF Ratio: The enterprise value-to-cash flow ratio is calculated as a company's enterprise value (market capitalization + value of total long-term debt + book value of preferred shares - cash and marketable securities) divided by the trailing-12-month (TTM) operating cash flow. It's a measure of how long it would take to buy the entire business if you were able to use all the company's operating cash flow.

The EV/CF ratio is perceived as more accurate than the P/CF ratio, in part, because the market price does not take a company's debt into account when valuing it.

EV/FCF Ratio: The enterprise value-to-free cash flow metric compares a company's enterprise value to its trailing-12-month (TTM) free cash flow (FCF). This metric is very similar to the EV/CF ratio, but is considered a more exact measure owing to the fact that it uses free cash flow, which subtracts capital expenditures (CAPEX) from a company's total operating cash flow, thereby reflecting the actual cash flow available for funding growth activities and payments to shareholders.

P/EBITDA Ratio: The P/EBITDA ratio is calculated as a company's per share market value divided by EBITDA (earnings before interest, taxes, depreciation, and amortization). This metric is very similar to the EV/EBITDA ratio, but is considered a little less exact measure as it uses market price, which does not take a company's debt into account. However, since EBITDA is often considered a proxy for cash income, the metric is used as a measure of what the market is willing to pay today for each dollar of the company's cash profitability in the trailing 12 months (TTM) or forward 12 months (F12M).

P/B Ratio: The price-to-book ratio is calculated as a company's current price per share divided by its book value (total assets – liabilities – preferred stocks) per share. In short, the book value is how much a company is worth. In other words, it reflects the total value of a company's assets that its common shareholders would receive if it were to be liquidated. So, the P/B ratio indicates whether you're paying higher or lower than what would remain if the company went bankrupt immediately. Investors typically use this metric to determine how a company's stock price stacks up to its intrinsic value.

P/TB Ratio: The price-to-tangible-book value ratio is calculated as a the per share market value of a company divided by the value of its tangible assets (total assets – liabilities – preferred stocks – intangible assets) per share. Tangible book value is the same thing as book value except it excludes the value of intangible assets to get a step closer to the baseline value of the company.

P/CF Ratio: The price-to-cash flow ratio measures a company's per share market price relative to its trailing-12-month (TTM) operating cash flow per share. This metric is used to determine whether a company is undervalued or overvalued relative to another stock, industry or sector. And like the P/E ratio, a lower number is typically considered better from the value perspective.

One of the reasons why P/CF ratio is often preferred over P/E ratio is the fact that operating cash flow adds back non-cash expenses such as depreciation and amortization to net income. This feature helps valuing stocks that have positive cash flow but are not profitable because of large noncash charges.

P/FCF Ratio: The price-to-free cash flow ratio is an extension of P/CF ratio, which uses trailing-12-month (TTM) free cash flow per share instead of operating cash flow per share. This metric is considered a more exact measure than P/CF ratio, as free cash flow subtracts capital expenditures (CAPEX) from a company's total operating cash flow, thereby reflecting the actual cash flow available for funding activities that generate additional revenues.

Earnings Yield: The earnings yield is calculated as current fiscal year (F1) EPS estimate divided by the company's current share price. The ratio, which is the inverse of the P/E ratio, measures the anticipated yield (or return) from earnings for each dollar invested in a stock today.

For example, earnings yield for a stock, which is trading at \$35 and expected to earn \$3 per share in the current fiscal year (F1), would be 0.0857 ($3/35 = 0.0857$) or 8.57%. In other words, for \$1 invested in the stock today, the yield from earnings is anticipated to be 8.57 cents.

Investors most commonly compare the earnings yield of a stock to that of a broad market index (such as the S&P 500) and prevailing interest rates, such as the current 10-year Treasury yield. Since bonds and stocks compete for investors' dollars, stock investors typically demand a higher yield for the extra risk they assume compared to investors of U.S. Treasury-backed securities that offer virtually risk-free returns. This additional return is referred to as the risk premium.

Debt/Equity Ratio: The debt-to-equity ratio is calculated as a company's total liabilities divided by its shareholder equity. This metric is used to gauge a company's financial leverage. In other words, it is a measure of the degree to which a company is financing its operations through debt versus its own funds. The higher the ratio, the higher the risk for shareholders.

However, this ratio is difficult to compare across industry groups where ideal amounts of debt vary. Some businesses are more capital intensive than others and typically require higher debt to finance their operations. So, a company's debt-to-equity ratio should be compared with other companies in the same industry.

Cash Flow (\$/share): Cash flow per share is calculated as operating cash flow (after-tax earnings + depreciation + other non-cash charges) divided by common shares outstanding. It is used by many investors as a measure of a company's financial strength. Since cash flow per share takes into consideration a company's ability to generate cash by adding back non-cash expenses, it is regarded by some as a more accurate measure of a company's financial situation than earnings per share, which could be artificially deflated.

Current Ratio: The current ratio or liquidity ratio is a company's current assets divided by its current liabilities. It measures a company's ability to pay short-term obligations. A current ratio that is in line with the industry average or slightly higher is generally considered acceptable. A current ratio that is lower than the industry average would indicate a higher risk of distress or default. A higher number is usually better. However, a very high current ratio compared to the industry average could be an indication of inefficient use of assets by management.

Debt/Capital Ratio: Debt-to-capital ratio is a company's total debt (interest-bearing debt + both short- and long-term liabilities) divided its total capital (interest-bearing debt + shareholders' equity). It is a measure of a company's financial leverage. All else being equal, the higher the debt-to-capital ratio, the riskier the stock.

However, this ratio can vary widely from industry to industry, the ideal amount of required debt being different. Some businesses are more capital intensive than others and typically require higher debt to finance their operations. So, a company's debt-to-capital ratio should be compared with the same for its industry.

Net Margin: Net margin is calculated as net income divided by sales. It shows how much of each dollar in sales generated by a company translates into profit. For example, if a company's net margin is 15%, its net income is 15 cents for every \$1 of sales it makes.

A change in margin can reflect either a change in business conditions, or a company's cost controls, or both. If a company's expenses are growing faster than sales, its net margin will decline. However, different net margin rates are considered good for different industries, so it's better to compare net margin rates of companies in the same industry group.

Return on Equity: Return on equity (ROE) is calculated as trailing-12-month net income divided by trailing-12-month average shareholder equity (including reinvested earnings). This metric is considered a measure of how effectively management is using a company's assets to generate profits. For example, if a company's ROE is 10%, it creates 10 cents profits for every \$1 shareholder equity, which is basically the company's assets minus debt. A company's ROE deemed good or bad depends on what's normal for its peers or industry group.

Sales/Assets Ratio: The sales-to-assets ratio or asset utilization ratio or asset turnover ratio is calculated as a company's annual sales divided by average assets (average of assets at the beginning of the year and at the year's end). This metric helps investors understand how effectively a company is using its assets to generate sales. For example, a sales-to-assets ratio of 2.5 indicates that the company generated \$2.50 in sales for every \$1 of assets on its books.

The higher the sales-to-assets ratio, the better the company is performing. However, similar to many other ratios, the asset turnover ratio tends to be higher for companies in certain industries/sectors than in others. So, a company's sales-to-assets ratio should be compared with the same for its industry/sector.

Historical EPS Growth (3-5 Years): This is the average annual (trailing-12-month) EPS growth rate over the last 3-5 years. This metric helps investors see how a company's EPS has grown from a long-term perspective.

Note: There are many factors that can influence short-term numbers — a recession will reduce this number, while a recovery will inflate it. The longterm perspective helps smooth out short-term events.

Projected EPS Growth (F1/F0): This is the estimated EPS growth rate for the current financial year. It is calculated as the consensus estimate for the current fiscal year (F1) divided by the reported EPS for the last completed fiscal year (F0).

Current Cash Flow Growth: It measures the latest year-over-year change in operating cash flow. Cash flow growth tells an investor how quickly a company is generating inflows of cash from operations. A positive change in the cash flow is desired and shows that more 'cash' is coming in than going out.

Historical Cash Flow Growth (3-5 Years): This is the annualized change in cash flow over the last 3-5 years. The change in a longer period helps put the current reading into proper perspective. By looking at the rate, rather than the actual dollar value, the comparison across the industry and peers becomes easier.

Projected Sales Growth (F1/F0): This metric looks at the estimated sales growth for the current year. It is calculated as sales estimate for the current fiscal year (F1) divided by the reported sales for the last completed fiscal year (F0).

Like EPS growth, a higher rate is better for sales growth. A look at a company's projected sales growth instantly tells you what the outlook is for their products and services. However, different sales growth rates are considered good for different industries, so it's better to compare sales growth rates of companies in the same industry group.

EPS F1 Estimate 1-Week Change: The percentage change in the Zacks Consensus EPS estimate for the current fiscal year over the past week. The change in a company's consensus EPS estimate (or earnings estimate revision) has proven to be strongly correlated with the near-term price movement of its shares. It is an integral part of the Zacks Rank.

If a stock's consensus EPS estimate is \$1.10 now versus \$1.00 a week ago, that will be reflected as a 10% upward revision. If, on the other hand, it went from \$1.00 to 90 cents, that would be a 10% downward revision.

EPS F1 Estimate 4-Week Change: The percentage change in the Zacks Consensus EPS estimate for the current fiscal year over the past four weeks.

A stock's earnings estimate revision in a 1-week period is important. But it's more meaningful to look at the longer-term revision. And, of course, the 4-week change helps put the 1-week change into proper perspective.

EPS F1 Estimate 12-Week Change: The percentage change in the Zacks Consensus EPS estimate for the current fiscal year over the past 12 weeks.

This metric essentially shows how the consensus EPS estimate has changed over a period longer than 1 week or 4 weeks.

EPS Q1 Estimate Monthly Change: The percentage change in the Zacks Consensus EPS estimate for the current fiscal quarter over the past four weeks.

While the revision in consensus EPS estimate for the current fiscal year is strongly correlated with the near-term price movement of its shares, the estimate revision for the current fiscal quarter is an important metric as well, especially over the short term, and particularly as a stock approaches its earnings date. If a stock's Q1 EPS estimate decreases ahead of its earnings release, it's usually a negative sign, whereas an increase is a positive sign.
