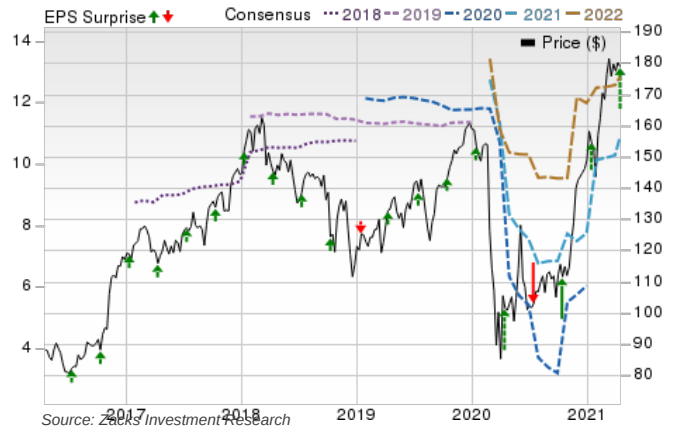

Summary

Shares of PNC Financial have outperformed the industry over the past six months. The company has an impressive earnings surprise history, having surpassed the Zacks Consensus Estimate in three of the trailing four quarters. First-quarter results reflect benefits from lower provisions and fee income growth. The company's commitment to expand the middle-market lending franchise, and bolster digital products and services offerings bode well. Execution of inorganic strategies to diversify revenue sources is likely to keep supporting its performance. However, with growing business and new investments in technology, continuously rising expenses will likely keep hurting the bottom line in the near term. Also, the bank's exposure to risky loan portfolio and weak loan demand makes us apprehensive amid the current uncertain operating backdrop.

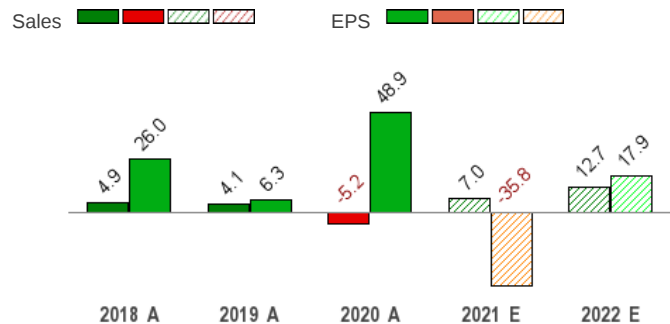
Price, Consensus & Surprise

Overview

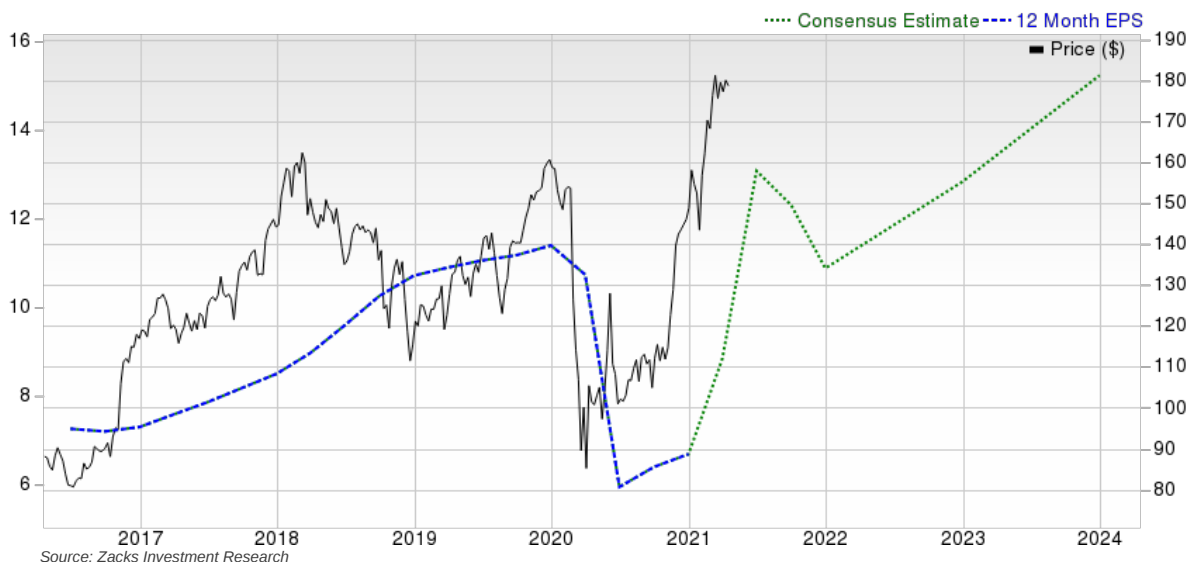
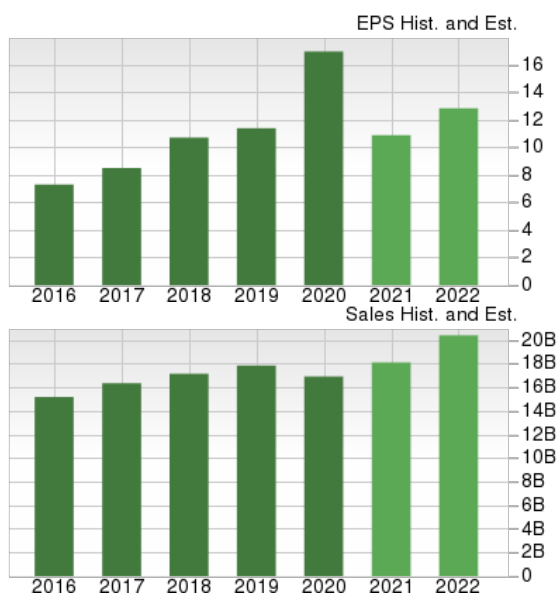
Headquartered in Pittsburgh and incepted in 1983, PNC Financial Services Group Inc. provides consumer and business banking services. The group's principal subsidiary is PNC Bank.

PNC Financial reports mainly through three business segments. Retail Banking provides deposit, lending, brokerage, investment management, and cash management services to consumer and small business customers branch network, ATM's, call centers and online & mobile banking channels.

Corporate and Institutional Banking segment provides lending, treasury management, and capital markets-related products and services to mid-sized and large corporations, government entities and not-for-profit organizations. Asset Management Group provides a wide range of wealth management products and services to individuals and their families, multi-generational family planning services to ultra-high net worth clients. Institutional Investments serves as an investment manager and trustee for companies, non-profit organizations and retirement plans across the country.

The Other category includes residual activities that do not meet the criteria for disclosure as a separate reportable business.

In April 2017, PNC Financial acquired U.S.-based commercial and vendor finance business of ECN Capital Corp in an all-cash transaction valued at \$1.1 billion. Further, in December 2017, it acquired The Trout Group, LLC, an investor relations and strategic advisory firm. PNC Financial also acquired Fortis Advisors with a view to expand advisory business.



Reasons To Buy:

- ▲ PNC Financial remains committed toward developing its business through strategic initiatives. In 2017, it expanded middle-market franchise to Dallas, Kansas City and Minneapolis and has plans to target more cities. Moreover, PNC Financial acquired two companies, which helped strengthen its advisory services. Also, in November 2020, the company announced plans to acquire BBVA USA Bancshares, Inc., including its U.S. banking subsidiary BBVA USA. The deal is expected to close in mid-2021 and make PNC Financial the fifth largest bank by assets. Notably, it plans to extend the reach of middle market corporate banking franchise into new markets, and expand its retail banking brand nationally. Thus, the company's bottom line is likely to get further support, if it continues to make planned investments.
- ▲ PNC Financial's net interest income (NII) has been benefiting from the higher interest-rate environment, increased yields and growth in loan balances. In the past four years (ended 2019), the company reported a rise in NII, after facing a volatile trend since 2009. While NII remained stable in 2020, it witnessed a decline in first-quarter 2021. Nevertheless, growth momentum in NII is likely to be recorded owing to lower borrowing and deposit costs, along with higher securities yields, partly offset by reduced loan yields.
- ▲ PNC Financial stands solid from the balance-sheet perspective. Notably, total loans and deposits have witnessed a five-year CAGR (2016-2020) of 3.5% and 9.2%, respectively. In the first quarter of 2021, loans witnessed a decline on slow resumption of business activities, while deposits continued to rise. Additional expected funding needs of commercial and consumer customers on gradual recovery of the economy, is likely to escalate loans and deposits balance.
- ▲ Following the 2020 stress test results, PNC Financial continues to maintain quarterly common stock dividend. Though it is refraining from announcing a share buyback plan until it closes the acquisition of BBVA USA by mid-2021, the company's debt/equity ratio compares favorably with the broader industry. Hence, its capital deployment activities might be sustainable.
- ▲ Shares of PNC Financial have outperformed the industry over the past six months. With this favorable trend, the company's current-year earnings estimates have been revised 6.2% upward over the past 30 days. Therefore, given the solid fundamentals and positive estimate revisions, the stock has upside potential.

PNC Financial's continues to undertake strategic initiatives with support from strong balance sheet. Also, sustainable capital deployments and steady loan growth are expected to benefit the company.

Reasons To Sell:

- ▼ Witnessing stable trend in the three-year period ended 2016, PNC Financial's expenses climbed at five-year CAGR (2016–2020) of 2.1%, with slight decrease in 2018. Costs witnessed an uptrend in the first three months of 2021. Higher levels of business activity, along with investments in technology and business infrastructure contributed to this upside. Though the company aims to fund part of its investments through continued improvement-savings program goals (\$300 million for 2021) that target cost containment, a rising expenses base is likely to continue impacting the bottom line in the near term.
- ▼ With support from higher interest rates, margin pressure for PNC Financial eased in the three years (ended 2018), after witnessing a declining trend for years. However, net interest margin (NIM) declined in 2019, 2020 and in the first three months of 2021 on account of a fall in interest rates. Given, the Federal Reserve's accommodative monetary policy stance and lower yields, we expect the bank's key metric to remain under pressure in the quarters ahead.
- ▼ Majority of PNC Financial's loan portfolio — nearly 70% as of Mar 31, 2021 — comprises total commercial loans. Such high exposure to commercial loans depicts lack of diversification, which can be risky for the company amid uncertain economy and competitive markets.
- ▼ PNC Financial's trailing 12-month return on equity (ROE) undercuts its growth potential. Though the company's ROE of 5.98% has gradually improved over the years, it compares unfavorably with the industry average of 9.24%, highlighting that it is less efficient in using shareholders' funds.

PNC Financial has an elevated expense base, which is likely to keep hurting profitability in the near term. Moreover, lack of diversification in its loan portfolio is a concern for the company.

Last Earnings Report

PNC Financial Q1 Earnings Beat on Decline in Provisions

PNC Financial pulled off first-quarter 2021 positive earnings surprise of 49.1% on substantial reserves release. Earnings per share of \$4.10 surpassed the Zacks Consensus Estimate of \$2.75. Also, the bottom line compared favorably with \$1.59 in the prior-year quarter.

Recapture of provisions and fee income growth on higher asset management revenues came as tailwinds. However, higher expenses and decline in revenues on lower interest income were the offsetting factors. Also, contraction of margin and fall in loans were negatives.

Net income in the first quarter came in at \$1.83 billion compared with \$915 million in the prior-year quarter.

Segment-wise, quarterly net income in Corporate & Institutional Banking and Retail banking climbed significantly, year over year. Also, the Asset Management Group registered growth of 83%. However, income at Other segment declined 59%.

Revenues and Loans Decline, Expenses Rise

Total revenues in the reported quarter came in at \$4.22 billion, down 3% year over year. The top line surpassed the Zacks Consensus Estimate of \$4.13 billion.

Net interest income declined 6% from the year-ago quarter to \$2.35 billion. The fall is attributable to lower yields on earning assets, partially offset by lower rates on deposits and borrowing costs and higher average earning assets. However, the net interest margin contracted 57 basis points to 2.27% due to lower yields on securities and loans, partially muted by lower funding costs.

Non-interest income was up 3% year over year to \$1.87 billion on higher asset management, corporate and consumer services revenues. This was partially muted by lower service charges on deposits and residential mortgage.

PNC Financial's non-interest expenses totaled \$2.57 billion, up 1% from the year-ago figure. This rise primarily resulted from higher personnel, equipment and occupancy costs.

Efficiency ratio was 61% compared with 59% in the year-ago quarter. Higher efficiency ratio indicates lower profitability.

As of Mar 31, 2021, total loans were down 2% sequentially to \$237 billion. However, total deposits improved 3% to \$375.1 billion.

Credit Quality: A Mixed Bag

Non-performing assets increased 24% year over year to \$2.18 billion. Also, allowance for loan and lease losses climbed 20% to \$4.71 billion.

However, the company reported provisions recapture of \$551 million against provisions for credit losses of \$914 million in the year-earlier quarter. Net charge-offs were \$146 million, down 31%.

Steady Capital Position

As of Mar 31, 2021, the Basel III common equity Tier 1 capital ratio was 12.6% compared with 9.4% as of Mar 31, 2020.

Return on average assets and average common equity came in at 1.58% and 14.31%, respectively, compared with 0.89% and 7.51% witnessed in the prior-year quarter.

Share Repurchase

In the first quarter of 2021, PNC Financial returned capital to shareholders through dividends on common shares of \$0.5 billion.

Outlook

Second-Quarter 2021

The company expects average loans to remain stable sequentially.

Management expects NII to increase 2% sequentially.

Fee income is expected to increase 3-5% sequentially. The company expects other non-interest income to be in the range of \$300-\$350 million.

Non-interest expenses are expected to remain stable sequentially.

Net loan charge-offs are estimated in the range of \$150-\$200 million.

Full-Year 2021

Average loan growth is anticipated to be down 3-4%.

Management expects total revenues to remain stable year over year, on forecasts of lower NII.

Recent News

PNC Financial Signs Deal to Buy BBVA USA Bancshares - Nov 16, 2020

PNC Financial has agreed to acquire BBVA USA Bancshares, Inc., including its U.S. banking subsidiary, BBVA USA from Banco Bilbao Vizcaya Argentaria, S.A. The all-cash transaction is valued at \$11.6 billion.

The transaction has been priced at 134% of BBVA USA's tangible book value, based on its balance sheet as of Sep 30, 2020. Also, it reflects a deposit premium of 3.7%.

Notably, the deal, expected to close in mid-2021, is part of PNC Financial's effort to expand presence in international markets.

Bank of America, Citigroup, Evercore and PNC Financial Institutions Advisory were the financial advisers for PNC Financial, while J.P. Morgan Securities plc acted as financial adviser to BBVA.

"Our acquisition of BBVA USA will accelerate our growth trajectory and drive long-term shareholder value through a strategic deployment of the proceeds from the sale of our BlackRock investment," said William S. Demchak, chairman, president and chief executive officer at PNC Financial.

Benefits From the Deal

PNC Financial anticipates the deal to be 21% accretive to its earnings in 2022. Also, the company expects the acquisition to replace the net income that PNC Financial earned from its passive equity investment in BlackRock, divested in May 2020.

The transaction has an estimated internal rate of return to PNC Financial in excess of 19%. Also, the acquisition will increase the company's deposits and loans by about \$86 billion and \$66 billion, respectively, based on BBVA USA's balance sheet as of Sep 30, 2020.

Post deal closure, the estimated allowance for credit losses to total loans for the combined entity is 2.85%, including reserves for the acquired loans from BBVA USA of 3.85%.

PNC Financial expects to incur merger and integration costs of \$980 million. It will include \$250 million in write-offs of capitalized items, and achieve cost savings of more than \$900 million, or 35% of BBVA USA's 2022 estimated annual noninterest expense through operational and administrative efficiency improvements.

Dividend Update

On Apr 1, PNC Financial's board of directors announced quarterly common stock dividend of \$1.15. The dividend will be paid out on May 5 to shareholders on record as of Apr 16.

Valuation

PNC Financial's shares are up 20% in the year-to-date period and 74.4% over the trailing 12-month period. Stocks in the Zacks sub-industry and Zacks Finance sector are up 24.5% and 13.9%, respectively, in the year-to-date period. Over the past year, the Zacks sub-industry and sector are up 66.5% and 51.2%, respectively.

The S&P 500 Index is up 12.3% in the year-to-date period and 51.2% in the past year.

The stock is currently trading at 15.6X forward 12 months earnings, which compares to 12.26X for the Zacks sub-industry, 17.1X for the Zacks sector and 23.29X for the S&P 500 Index.

Over the past five years, the stock has traded as high as 20.33X and as low as 6.95X, with a 5-year median of 13.6X. Our Neutral recommendation indicates that the stock will perform in line with the market. Our \$188 price target reflects 16.38X forward earnings.

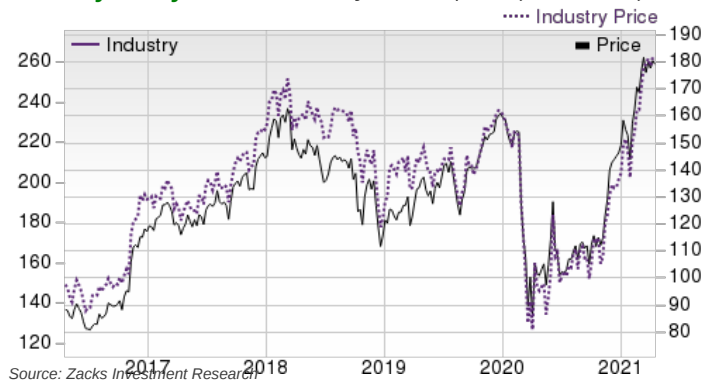

Zacks Stock Rating System

We offer two rating systems that take into account investors' holding horizons: Zacks Rank and Zacks Recommendation. Each provides valuable insights into the future profitability of the stock and can be used separately or in combination with each other depending on your investment style.

Zacks Recommendation

The Zacks Recommendation aims to predict performance over the next 6 to 12 months. The foundation for the quantitatively determined Zacks Recommendation is trends in the company's estimate revisions and earnings outlook. The Zacks Recommendation is broken down into 3 Levels; Outperform, Neutral and Underperform. Unlike many Wall Street firms, we maintain a balance between the number of Outperform and Neutral recommendations. Our team of 70 analysts are fully versed in the benefits of earnings estimate revisions and how that is harnessed through the Zacks quantitative rating system. But we have given our analysts the ability to override the Zacks Recommendation for the 1200 stocks that they follow. The reason for the analyst over-rides is that there are often factors such as valuation, industry conditions and management effectiveness that a trained investment professional can spot better than a quantitative model.

Zacks Rank

The Zacks Rank is our short-term rating system that is most effective over the one- to three-month holding horizon. The underlying driver for the quantitatively-determined Zacks Rank is the same as the Zacks Recommendation, and reflects trends in earnings estimate revisions.

Zacks Style Scores

The Zacks Style Score is as a complementary indicator to the Zacks rating system, giving investors a way to focus on the highest rated stocks that best fit their own stock picking preferences.

Academic research has proven that stocks with the best Value, Growth and Momentum characteristics outperform the market. The Zacks Style Scores rate stocks on each of these individual styles and assigns a rating of A, B, C, D and F. We also produce the VGM Score (V for Value, G for Growth and M for Momentum), which combines the weighted average of the individual Style Scores into one score. This is perfectly suited for those who want their stocks to have the best scores across the board.

Glossary of Terms and Definitions

52-Week High-Low: The range of the highest and lowest prices at which a stock has traded during the past year. This range is determined based on the stock's daily closing price which may differ from the intra-day high or low. Many investors use it as a technical indicator to determine a stock's current value and future price movement. The idea here is that if price breaks out from the 52-week range, in either direction, the momentum may continue in the same direction.

20-Day Average Volume (Shares): The average number of shares of a company traded in a day over the last 20 days. It is a direct indication of a security's overall liquidity. The higher the average daily trading volume, the easier it is to enter or exit the stock at a desired price with more buyers and sellers being available.

Daily Price Change: This is the percentage difference between a trading day's closing price and the prior trading day's closing price. This item is updated at 9 p.m. EST each day.

1-Week Price Change: This is the percentage change in a stock's closing price over the last 5 trading days. This change reflects the collective buying and selling sentiment over the 1-week period.

A strong weekly price increase for the stock, especially when accompanied by increased volume, is an indication of it gaining momentum.

4-Week Price Change: This is the percentage change in a stock's closing price over the last 20 trading days or past 4 weeks. This is a medium-term price change metric and an indication of the stock gaining momentum.

12-Week Price Change: This is the percentage change of a stock's closing price over the last 60 trading days or past 12 weeks. Similar to 4-week price change, this is a medium-term price change metric. It shows whether a stock has been enjoying strong investor demand, or if it has been in consolidation, or distress over this period.

52-Week Price Change: This is the percentage change in a stock's closing price over the last 260 trading days or past 52 weeks. This long-term price change metric is a good reference point for investors. Some investors seek stocks with the best percentage price change over the last 52 weeks, expecting the momentum to continue.

Market Cap: The number of outstanding common shares of a company times its latest price per share. This figure represents a company's size, which indicates various characteristics, including price stability and risk, in which investors could be interested.

Year-To-Date Price Change: Change in a stock's daily closing price in the period of time beginning the first day of the current calendar year through to the previous trading day.

of Analysts: Number of EPS estimates used in calculating the current-quarter consensus. These estimates come from the brokerage analysts tracking this stock. However, the number of such analysts tracking this stock may not match the number of estimates, as all brokerage analysts may not come up with an estimate or provide it to us.

Beta: A measure of risk commonly used to compare the volatility of a stock to the overall market. The S&P 500 Index is the base for calculating beta and carries a value of 1. A stock with beta below 1 is less risky than the market as a whole. And a stock with beta above 1 is riskier.

Dividend: The portion of earnings a company is expected to distribute to its common shareholders in the next 12 months for each share they own. Dividends are usually paid quarterly. Dividend payments reflect positively on a company and help maintain investors' trust. Investors typically find dividend-paying stocks appealing because the dividend adds to any market price appreciation to result in higher return on investment (ROI). Moreover, a steady or increasing dividend payment provides investors a cushion in a down market.

Dividend Yield: The ratio of a company's annual dividend to its share price. The annual dividend used in the ratio is calculated based on the most recent dividend paid by the company. Dividend yield is an estimate of the dividend-only return from a stock in the next 12 months. Since dividend itself doesn't change frequently, dividend yield usually changes with a stock's price movement. As a result, often an unusually high dividend yield is a result of weak stock price.

S&P 500 Index: The Standard & Poor's 500 (S&P 500) Index is an unmanaged group of securities considered to be representative of the stock market in general. It is a market-capitalization-weighted index of stocks of the 500 largest U.S. companies. Each stock's weight in the index is proportionate to its market value.

Industry: One of the 250+ groups that Zacks classifies all stocks into based on the nature of business. These groups are termed as expanded (aka "X") industries and map to their respective (economic) sectors; Zacks has 16 sectors.

Zacks Industry Rank: The Zacks Industry Rank is determined by calculating the average Zacks Rank for all stocks in the industry and then assigning an ordinal rank to it. For example, an industry with an average Zacks Rank of 1.6 is better than an industry with an average Zacks Rank of 2.3. So, the industry with the better average Zacks Rank would get a better Zacks Industry Rank. If an industry has the best average Zacks Rank, it would be considered the top industry (1 out of 250+), which would place it at the top 1% of Zacks-ranked industries. Studies have shown that roughly half of a stock's price movement can be attributed to the industry group it belongs to. In fact, the top 50% of Zacks-ranked industries outperforms the bottom 50% by a factor of more than 2 to 1.

Last EPS Surprise: The percentage deviation of a company's last reported earnings per share from the Zacks Consensus Estimate. Companies with a positive earnings surprise are more likely to surprise again in the future (or miss again if they recently missed).

Last Sales Surprise: The percentage deviation of a company's last reported sales from the Zacks Consensus Estimate.

Expected Report Date: This is an estimated date of a company's next earnings release. The information originated or gathered by Zacks Investment Research from its information providers or publicly available sources is the basis of this estimate.

Earnings ESP: The Zacks Earnings ESP compares the Most Accurate Estimate to the Zacks Consensus Estimate for the yet-to-be reported quarter. The Most Accurate Estimate is the most recent version of the Zacks Consensus EPS Estimate. The idea here is that analysts revising their estimates closer to an earnings release have the latest information, which could potentially be more accurate than what they and others contributing to the consensus had predicted earlier. Thus, a positive or negative Earnings ESP reading theoretically indicates the likely deviation of the actual earnings from the consensus estimate. However, the model's predictive power is significant for positive ESP readings only. A positive Earnings ESP is a strong predictor of an earnings beat, particularly when combined with a Zacks Rank #1 (Strong Buy), #2 (Buy) or #3 (Hold). Our research shows that stocks with this combination produce a positive surprise nearly 70% of the time.

Periods:

TTM: Trailing 12 months. Using TTM figures is an effective way of analyzing the most-recent financial data in an annualized format that helps neutralize the effects of seasonality and other quarter-to-quarter variation.

F1: Current fiscal year. This period is used to analyze the estimates for the ongoing full fiscal year.

F2: Next fiscal year. This period is used to analyze the estimates for the next full fiscal year.

F12M: Forward 12 months. Using F12M figures is an effective way of analyzing the near-term (the following four unreported quarters) estimates in an annualized manner. Instead of typically representing estimates for the full fiscal year, which may not represent the nitty-gritty of each quarter, F12M figures suggest an all-inclusive annualized estimate for the following four quarters. The annualization helps neutralize the potential effects of seasonality and other quarter-to-quarter variations.

P/E Ratio: The price-to-earnings ratio measures a company's current market price per share relative to its earnings per share (EPS). Usually, the trailing-12-month (TTM) EPS, current-fiscal-year (F1) EPS estimate, or forward-12-month (F12M) EPS estimate is used as the denominator. In essence, this ratio shows what the market is willing to pay today for each dollar of EPS. In other words, this ratio gives a sense of what the relative value of the company is at the already reported level of earnings or at a future level of earnings.

It is one of the most widely-used multiples for determining the value of a company and helps comparing its valuation with that of a competitor, the industry group or a benchmark.

PEG Ratio: The price/earnings to growth ratio is a stock's P/E ratio using current fiscal year (F1) EPS estimate divided by its expected EPS growth rate over the coming 3 to 5 years. This ratio essentially determines a stock's value by factoring in the company's expected earnings growth and is thus believed to provide a more complete picture than just the P/E ratio, particularly for faster-growing companies.

P/S Ratio: The price-to-sales ratio is calculated as a company's current price per share divided by trailing 12 months (TTM) sales or revenues per share. This ratio shows what the market is willing to pay today for each dollar of TTM sales per share. The P/S ratio is at times the only valuation metric when the company has yet to become profitable.

Cash/Price Ratio: The cash-to-price ratio or Cash Yield is calculated as cash and marketable securities per share divided by the company's current share price. Like the earnings yield, which shows the anticipated yield (or return) on a stock from earnings for each dollar invested, the cash yield does the same, with cash being the source of return instead of earnings. For example, a cash/price ratio of 0.08 suggests a return of 8% or 8 cents for every \$1 investment.

EV/EBITDA Ratio: The EV/EBITDA ratio, also known as Enterprise Multiple, is calculated as a company's enterprise value (market capitalization + value of total long-term debt + book value of preferred shares - cash and marketable securities) divided by EBITDA (earnings before interest, taxes, depreciation and amortization). Usually, trailing-12-month (TTM) or forward-12-month (F12M) EBITDA is used as the denominator.

EV/Sales Ratio: The enterprise value-to-sales ratio is calculated as a company's enterprise value (market capitalization + value of total long-term debt + book value of preferred shares - cash and marketable securities) divided by annual sales. It is an expansion of the P/S valuation, which uses market value instead of enterprise value. The EV/Sales ratio is perceived as more accurate than P/S, in part, because the market capitalization does not take a company's debt into account when valuing it.

EV/CF Ratio: The enterprise value-to-cash flow ratio is calculated as a company's enterprise value (market capitalization + value of total long-term debt + book value of preferred shares - cash and marketable securities) divided by the trailing-12-month (TTM) operating cash flow. It's a measure of how long it would take to buy the entire business if you were able to use all the company's operating cash flow.

The EV/CF ratio is perceived as more accurate than the P/CF ratio, in part, because the market price does not take a company's debt into account when valuing it.

EV/FCF Ratio: The enterprise value-to-free cash flow metric compares a company's enterprise value to its trailing-12-month (TTM) free cash flow (FCF). This metric is very similar to the EV/CF ratio, but is considered a more exact measure owing to the fact that it uses free cash flow, which subtracts capital expenditures (CAPEX) from a company's total operating cash flow, thereby reflecting the actual cash flow available for funding growth activities and payments to shareholders.

P/EBITDA Ratio: The P/EBITDA ratio is calculated as a company's per share market value divided by EBITDA (earnings before interest, taxes, depreciation, and amortization). This metric is very similar to the EV/EBITDA ratio, but is considered a little less exact measure as it uses market price, which does not take a company's debt into account. However, since EBITDA is often considered a proxy for cash income, the metric is used as a measure of what the market is willing to pay today for each dollar of the company's cash profitability in the trailing 12 months (TTM) or forward 12 months (F12M).

P/B Ratio: The price-to-book ratio is calculated as a company's current price per share divided by its book value (total assets – liabilities – preferred stocks) per share. In short, the book value is how much a company is worth. In other words, it reflects the total value of a company's assets that its common shareholders would receive if it were to be liquidated. So, the P/B ratio indicates whether you're paying higher or lower than what would remain if the company went bankrupt immediately. Investors typically use this metric to determine how a company's stock price stacks up to its intrinsic value.

P/TB Ratio: The price-to-tangible-book value ratio is calculated as a the per share market value of a company divided by the value of its tangible assets (total assets – liabilities – preferred stocks – intangible assets) per share. Tangible book value is the same thing as book value except it excludes the value of intangible assets to get a step closer to the baseline value of the company.

P/CF Ratio: The price-to-cash flow ratio measures a company's per share market price relative to its trailing-12-month (TTM) operating cash flow per share. This metric is used to determine whether a company is undervalued or overvalued relative to another stock, industry or sector. And like the P/E ratio, a lower number is typically considered better from the value perspective.

One of the reasons why P/CF ratio is often preferred over P/E ratio is the fact that operating cash flow adds back non-cash expenses such as depreciation and amortization to net income. This feature helps valuing stocks that have positive cash flow but are not profitable because of large noncash charges.

P/FCF Ratio: The price-to-free cash flow ratio is an extension of P/CF ratio, which uses trailing-12-month (TTM) free cash flow per share instead of operating cash flow per share. This metric is considered a more exact measure than P/CF ratio, as free cash flow subtracts capital expenditures (CAPEX) from a company's total operating cash flow, thereby reflecting the actual cash flow available for funding activities that generate additional revenues.

Earnings Yield: The earnings yield is calculated as current fiscal year (F1) EPS estimate divided by the company's current share price. The ratio, which is the inverse of the P/E ratio, measures the anticipated yield (or return) from earnings for each dollar invested in a stock today.

For example, earnings yield for a stock, which is trading at \$35 and expected to earn \$3 per share in the current fiscal year (F1), would be 0.0857 ($3/35 = 0.0857$) or 8.57%. In other words, for \$1 invested in the stock today, the yield from earnings is anticipated to be 8.57 cents.

Investors most commonly compare the earnings yield of a stock to that of a broad market index (such as the S&P 500) and prevailing interest rates, such as the current 10-year Treasury yield. Since bonds and stocks compete for investors' dollars, stock investors typically demand a higher yield for the extra risk they assume compared to investors of U.S. Treasury-backed securities that offer virtually risk-free returns. This additional return is referred to as the risk premium.

Debt/Equity Ratio: The debt-to-equity ratio is calculated as a company's total liabilities divided by its shareholder equity. This metric is used to gauge a company's financial leverage. In other words, it is a measure of the degree to which a company is financing its operations through debt versus its own funds. The higher the ratio, the higher the risk for shareholders.

However, this ratio is difficult to compare across industry groups where ideal amounts of debt vary. Some businesses are more capital intensive than others and typically require higher debt to finance their operations. So, a company's debt-to-equity ratio should be compared with other companies in the same industry.

Cash Flow (\$/share): Cash flow per share is calculated as operating cash flow (after-tax earnings + depreciation + other non-cash charges) divided by common shares outstanding. It is used by many investors as a measure of a company's financial strength. Since cash flow per share takes into consideration a company's ability to generate cash by adding back non-cash expenses, it is regarded by some as a more accurate measure of a company's financial situation than earnings per share, which could be artificially deflated.

Current Ratio: The current ratio or liquidity ratio is a company's current assets divided by its current liabilities. It measures a company's ability to pay short-term obligations. A current ratio that is in line with the industry average or slightly higher is generally considered acceptable. A current ratio that is lower than the industry average would indicate a higher risk of distress or default. A higher number is usually better. However, a very high current ratio compared to the industry average could be an indication of inefficient use of assets by management.

Debt/Capital Ratio: Debt-to-capital ratio is a company's total debt (interest-bearing debt + both short- and long-term liabilities) divided its total capital (interest-bearing debt + shareholders' equity). It is a measure of a company's financial leverage. All else being equal, the higher the debt-to-capital ratio, the riskier the stock.

However, this ratio can vary widely from industry to industry, the ideal amount of required debt being different. Some businesses are more capital intensive than others and typically require higher debt to finance their operations. So, a company's debt-to-capital ratio should be compared with the same for its industry.

Net Margin: Net margin is calculated as net income divided by sales. It shows how much of each dollar in sales generated by a company translates into profit. For example, if a company's net margin is 15%, its net income is 15 cents for every \$1 of sales it makes.

A change in margin can reflect either a change in business conditions, or a company's cost controls, or both. If a company's expenses are growing faster than sales, its net margin will decline. However, different net margin rates are considered good for different industries, so it's better to compare net margin rates of companies in the same industry group.

Return on Equity: Return on equity (ROE) is calculated as trailing-12-month net income divided by trailing-12-month average shareholder equity (including reinvested earnings). This metric is considered a measure of how effectively management is using a company's assets to generate profits. For example, if a company's ROE is 10%, it creates 10 cents profits for every \$1 shareholder equity, which is basically the company's assets minus debt. A company's ROE deemed good or bad depends on what's normal for its peers or industry group.

Sales/Assets Ratio: The sales-to-assets ratio or asset utilization ratio or asset turnover ratio is calculated as a company's annual sales divided by average assets (average of assets at the beginning of the year and at the year's end). This metric helps investors understand how effectively a company is using its assets to generate sales. For example, a sales-to-assets ratio of 2.5 indicates that the company generated \$2.50 in sales for every \$1 of assets on its books.

The higher the sales-to-assets ratio, the better the company is performing. However, similar to many other ratios, the asset turnover ratio tends to be higher for companies in certain industries/sectors than in others. So, a company's sales-to-assets ratio should be compared with the same for its industry/sector.

Historical EPS Growth (3-5 Years): This is the average annual (trailing-12-month) EPS growth rate over the last 3-5 years. This metric helps investors see how a company's EPS has grown from a long-term perspective.

Note: There are many factors that can influence short-term numbers — a recession will reduce this number, while a recovery will inflate it. The longterm perspective helps smooth out short-term events.

Projected EPS Growth (F1/F0): This is the estimated EPS growth rate for the current financial year. It is calculated as the consensus estimate for the current fiscal year (F1) divided by the reported EPS for the last completed fiscal year (F0).

Current Cash Flow Growth: It measures the latest year-over-year change in operating cash flow. Cash flow growth tells an investor how quickly a company is generating inflows of cash from operations. A positive change in the cash flow is desired and shows that more 'cash' is coming in than going out.

Historical Cash Flow Growth (3-5 Years): This is the annualized change in cash flow over the last 3-5 years. The change in a longer period helps put the current reading into proper perspective. By looking at the rate, rather than the actual dollar value, the comparison across the industry and peers becomes easier.

Projected Sales Growth (F1/F0): This metric looks at the estimated sales growth for the current year. It is calculated as sales estimate for the current fiscal year (F1) divided by the reported sales for the last completed fiscal year (F0).

Like EPS growth, a higher rate is better for sales growth. A look at a company's projected sales growth instantly tells you what the outlook is for their products and services. However, different sales growth rates are considered good for different industries, so it's better to compare sales growth rates of companies in the same industry group.

EPS F1 Estimate 1-Week Change: The percentage change in the Zacks Consensus EPS estimate for the current fiscal year over the past week. The change in a company's consensus EPS estimate (or earnings estimate revision) has proven to be strongly correlated with the near-term price movement of its shares. It is an integral part of the Zacks Rank.

If a stock's consensus EPS estimate is \$1.10 now versus \$1.00 a week ago, that will be reflected as a 10% upward revision. If, on the other hand, it went from \$1.00 to 90 cents, that would be a 10% downward revision.

EPS F1 Estimate 4-Week Change: The percentage change in the Zacks Consensus EPS estimate for the current fiscal year over the past four weeks.

A stock's earnings estimate revision in a 1-week period is important. But it's more meaningful to look at the longer-term revision. And, of course, the 4-week change helps put the 1-week change into proper perspective.

EPS F1 Estimate 12-Week Change: The percentage change in the Zacks Consensus EPS estimate for the current fiscal year over the past 12 weeks.

This metric essentially shows how the consensus EPS estimate has changed over a period longer than 1 week or 4 weeks.

EPS Q1 Estimate Monthly Change: The percentage change in the Zacks Consensus EPS estimate for the current fiscal quarter over the past four weeks.

While the revision in consensus EPS estimate for the current fiscal year is strongly correlated with the near-term price movement of its shares, the estimate revision for the current fiscal quarter is an important metric as well, especially over the short term, and particularly as a stock approaches its earnings date. If a stock's Q1 EPS estimate decreases ahead of its earnings release, it's usually a negative sign, whereas an increase is a positive sign.
